CHURCH SECRETARY'S REPORT FOR 2023

As of 31st December 2023 the Annual Return to the URC head office and Northern Synod showed our membership to be 107. During 2023 six of our members died. These were Joan Hyde, Tom Mullens, Mary Souza, Chris Rowlands, Pat Bristow and Ted Le Grice. Our minister also led the funerals of Noreen Peel, Joan Trotter and Jack Henderson.

During the year there was one baptism, namely Esme Eve Brown.

Louise Sanders is no longer on our Member's list as she has taken on her new role as Minister of St Andrew's church, Whitley Bay. We wish her every success.

We were delighted to welcome one new member in 2023, namely Christine Oliver.

The average number attending each week is 65 plus 6 children. We also have 8 regular attenders who are not church members.

Junior Church has 6 children who attend regularly, 1 in the 0-4 category and 5 in the 11-17 category.

There are 106 children and young people across all age groups in the uniformed organisations, comprising Rainbows, Brownies, Guides and Rangers.

We are also strengthening our affiliation with the air cadets through their participation and attendance at the Community Carol Service and The Air Cadet Service. Over 40 of them attended this year.

The number of serving Elders is currently 9 with 2 new Elders to be appointed in 2024.

Annual Report of the Managers for 2023

The year began with the managers looking at how they might replace Neil, who had finally decided to step down as Property Manager. It is difficult to overstate how much we owe to him; he has been instrumental in maintaining the both church and, until recently, the manse, and we have not succeeded in finding any single person prepared to take on the onerous job that Neil has vacated. The decision has now been taken that, *pro tem.*, we will divide the duties of the post between the current managers as equitably as we can, but it is also important that all church members recognize that several of us are on a relatively steep

learning curve! In the interim, Neil is still available to give us guidance and help: we are all very grateful for this!

Another issue, which the Treasurer will wish to discuss in more detail, but which has implications for the whole church, is the ending of the SENEA agreement and the return of St George's to its previously customary position within the Northern Synod. In particular, since it relates to an issue with management of church property, the maintenance of the manse now becomes our responsibility again.

A major initiative this year has been the decision to completely revamp the church's risk register and safety policies. We are immensely indebted to Ken Anderson for taking on this mammoth task and his (possibly incommensurate) reward has been an invitation to join the managers' team. Whilst responsibility for Health and Safety issues rests with the Minister and Elders, the managers have to play a major role in actioning any changes necessary. Ken has been particularly helpful in ensuring that all the innumerable inspections and reports needed in a large and complex building, are firmly attached to individuals named. Following a careful tour of the building, Ken has also prepared a church risk register which is now available for inspection. We are also grateful that Gordon Slack has agreed to look after the electrical issues in the church; he is also now a much-valued member of the management team, in addition to Ken, and safety, risk and electrical issues are now a standard part of the managers' agenda at our meetings.

Amongst the property related issues this last year (many of which grew out of the Quinquennial report) we have seen: the continuing programme of replacement of fluorescent tubes in the church with LED lighting; the replacement of the mains supply to the outside crib with a 12V supply (for which we are grateful to Allen Oakes and some of the managers); the lighting system for the church clock; a new notice board for the church; the painting of the rainwater goods and railings; the replacement of the photocopier, the operation of which is subtly different from its familiar predecessor(!); the new audio-visual system (for which we are grateful for the Synod Trust's contribution); a new litter bin to counteract the disappearance of the old one into which food remnants used to be thrown; a list of those responsible for the safety of the lift and its inspections; the change in key code for admission to the church; the replacement of the blinds in the upper hall; a new monitor to allow the organist to participate more fully in those services using audio-visual equipment; the pruning of the cherry tree; and the repair of the malfunctioning dishwasher in the downstairs kitchen. This is not an exhaustive list, but it may give an indication of the scale of the managers' responsibility.

On other matters, the church has continued to have a good programme of events, including concerts, coffee mornings and talks. Our thanks go to Gillian Irvine, Sarah Cleverley and many others who help at these events; anyone arriving at a coffee morning will have been amazed at the attendance and enthusiasm, particularly for those events where sales of goods are taking place. Housekeeping continues under the watchful eyes of Sarah, Joan and Mary; one matter on which the managers spent some time this last year was the new safety issues with regard to food hygiene; these do make it very difficult for us to offer the kinds of meal-based entertainments that we offered in the past. Sarah also looks after stewarding, and we would encourage anyone who wants to be a little more involved in the church and to get to know more people, to volunteer for this. Andy Cleverley has had his first full year as lettings manager developing the church's business in this area; we have not fully recovered from the lockdowns, and it is clear that many organisations are also struggling to recover their previous membership. Outreach by the church in the form of the website and Facebook seems to be going well: average hit rates for the website are now about 150 per week, which suggests that we are reaching out to quite a sizeable audience.

Church Lettings in 2023

Total Lettings income for 2023 was £4184.00, including uninvoiced amounts from Lay Preachers £25, Ceilidh Band £50, Guides Christingle £50.

This is down by £800 on last year, which can be accounted for by the Dance Academy, CAST, who paid us £715, and Northumberland CC Music Dept who paid rent of £180 before the teacher went on maternity leave.

In summer 2023 our best customer, the Cobwebs Orchestra, moved to KEVI for zero rent. Income from this source was £750 in 2023.

We have a new group, a choir, called Alnwick Allstars, run by Linnea Tormajer and Dave Coulson who run choirs in Alnwick and the Borders. They meet in the sanctuary on Thursdays.

Excluding the Cobwebs, our clients were Ronke's Exercise Class, Lisa's Zumba Class and the Lateral Art shop. Morpeth Panto Society did 4 weeks of workshops in the summer. A trainee Yoga instructor is giving classes in the Drysdale Room once a week as part of her qualification work.

Our players can number between 6 and 12 on average; ee can have 5 string players 3 violins, a viola, and cello. Wood wind can consist of recorder, 2 flutes, 2 clarinets, alto saxophone and bassoon. Brass can include trombone and tuba players.

A band provided music along with Andrew on piano for World Day of Prayer held in St.George's in March 2023 and in 2024 we will be playing at St. Robert's. It is always fun to join with the Junior church in their Nativity Service held either here at St.George's or at Morpeth Methodist Church. In addition Shirley Forster recruits players for special services in Bavington and a Christmas Carol service in Hauxley all of which are enjoyed and appreciated by those involved.

During the summer holiday period Shirley organised a number of Playalong sessions in the Horsley room using arrangements of music gathered over the years with parts provided suitable for a wide variety of instruments. We are fortunate to have so many players who come to join us from our friends in Cobweb Orchestra, Society of Recorder Players, and from other churches including St. Robert's. Although you do have to bring your own refreshments! .. Some folk come to every meeting but many people can only make it occasionally and they are welcome too. The money all goes to St Georges. From Feb 23 to Feb 24 we have donated close to £500 which we hope covers our heating and lighting!

We recently had a trip out to Forest Hall to play for a special ceilidh for 'Walking with asylum seeker support' Wallsend, and were overjoyed that this raised £930!!!

Who are the dancers: only a very few are St George's members, which we are a bit sad about. We would love you to come and join in. Many are people who visit St George's to take part in other groups and some are from other Morpeth churches, or Morpeth residents. However we attract people from as far away as Newcastle and Durham. Most of us are the 'active retired' brigade, We dance with enthusiasm but we don't whirl around doing baskets like the teenagers! We would welcome more dancers. If you enjoy going for a walk, or take part in gentle sport or keep fit, you will be able to join in the dances easily. You do not need to bring a partner, we all dance with each other. We still miss Jared so much, but 4 of us have stepped into his 'Caller' shoes so there is a wide variety of dances.

Who is the band: a few St George's folk, a few friends who also come along to play for the church orchestra, and a few friends who belong to other musical groups. We welcome all abilities. and instruments. Adult beginners are encouraged and supported by more skilled players. All sorts of instruments have been included from descant recorder to trombone, fiddles to saxophone. Players come along when they are free -some every meeting, some very occasionally. We practice for an hour together before each dance. It is not a big commitment and lots of fun. Ceilidh band players join with church orchestra players to make up groups to play for special events like the World Day of Prayer service, and special services -midsummer at Bavington, and carols at Low Hauxley Methodist chapel.
