A Message from our Minister, Revd Julian Sanders

Dear friends, Merry Xmas.

I know what you are already thinking — "Xmas!" whatever happened to "Christmas!" — Its just another example of how society today is forgetting the real reason for this seasonal celebration. I have heard people worrying that there are no religious Christmas cards being sold, that there are no nativity scenes adorning our seasonal postage stamps, and that our decorated shop windows recognise our worship of Consumerism rather than the Christ child (apart from Rutherford's of course, who continue to carry on the tradition). I wonder why we are so worried about these things.....and what is so wrong with wishing people a Happy Xmas.

You may have seen that the Lindisfarne Gospels have been on display at the Laing Art Gallery in Newcastle and that a replica of the Lindisfarne Gospels was on display in Morpeth library also during this time. I went to have a look at the Morpeth library display and was impressed by the amount of detail and artistry that has been put into just a few words of the gospels.

Unfortunately I was not able to see the Chi Rho page that adorns the beginning of Matthew's gospel. As the first of the gospels, the beginning of Matthew's gospel is suitably ornate as to be a gateway into the gospels. It is a page richly decorated so that the reader can meditate and contemplate on the images as they enter into reading the gospel.

It is called the Chi Rho page because the focus of the design for the page is the two Greek letters Chi and Rho, being the "Ch" and "r" of Christ. The "Ch" is shaped like an "X" and the "Rho" as a nearly recognisable "R" and in and around these two letters an intricately woven design of birds, animals, and knotwork patterns that have become familiar with Celtic Christianity.

It is this same "x" that is used to represent the whole word "Christ" in modern abbreviations. So when you see or write "Xmas" you are in fact drawing on a very ancient concept which is celebrated in the Lindisfarne Gospels. Rather than leaving "Christ" out of Christmas, actually you are writing exactly the same thing — and perhaps even a little more traditionally?

December Notes by the Way by Stuart Brock

Our eldest son, Jon and family, live in Sydney, Australia. We have been across the globe a few times to visit them, usually just as the Continent is coming into Spring. This, in the Southern Hemisphere means the months of September to November – which feels kind of strange to us, for obvious reasons. We have experienced some of the warmth for which the Continent is famous and been present when bush fire warnings have been at 'high' or even 'critical' risk. Fortunately these warnings have not developed into actual fires while we have been staying there, but they are a reminder of just how hot and dry the country can be.

On one visit in October with the temperatures hovering around the 30C mark we were surprised to see the shops already decorated for Christmas. There were displays of tinsel, boxes of baubles and artificial Christmas trees covered in artificial snow. Christmas lights twinkled in the shop windows. As the month wore on, adverts appeared persuading parents to pay for their kids to see Santa Claus. On a visit to a department store in central Sydney, Mr Claus himself came out of his grotto. He was wearing his traditional bright red suit, his head covered with a red hood. He had a long, fluffy white beard and long black boots. The temperature outside that day had already hit 26C and it was still only 11am! Clearly Mr S. Claus is as busy in the Southern Hemisphere as he is in the Northern, the weather notwithstanding. We have never stayed Down Under as late as December, the real Australian Summer but we understand that Christmas Day is celebrated in many parts of the country with as much enthusiasm as in the UK. Australians flock in their thousands to the beach to relax and chill with a big 'Barbie, and all this when, by December 25th, temperatures may have reached. 40C.

One's experience of the Festive Season would seem, at first sight, very different, depending on which part of the world one lives in. Another branch of the family lives in Canada. My cousin is a retired sheep farmer in Alberta. He regularly reports that temperatures can fall as low as minus 30C at this time of the year and there is thick snow on the ground for much of the Winter and into the Spring – ideal conditions for skis (and of course for reindeer and sleighs!)

Two contrasting experiences of this time of year. But whether we remember the story of the first Christmas from the point of view of the heat of Bondi Beach or the cold of the Canadian plain, (or the dreary damp of a British Winter come to that) the core message is the same.

It tells of a love that has no boundaries of climate or geography, history or time and space. It speaks of a Child who will one day be ruler of all nations. He will show that love by giving his life away to bring salvation to the world.

We don't need a heavy fall of snow to provide a romantic background to the Christmas story. We don't need to dream of a white Christmas or, alternatively of endless sunshine and blue skies. All we need is a little faith to believe that God has come among us in the humility of a newborn Child to show us the way to live, so that we, wherever we are, can also follow that way. This story is as relevant in a needy world as it has ever been.

We are hoping the family Down Under will be able to visit us next year during our Summer. We must remind them to bring a jumper or two. They might still feel a little chilly in any potential Northumbrian heatwave!

Refugees December 2022

Both West End Refugee Service and Justice and Peace Refugee Service reflect on the effect the national situation is having on their work and the service users they seek to support. J&P sum it up by saying "We continue to reflect on what is happening in the world around us, nationally and internationally. All of the current issues are starting to affect everyone here at home. We understand all of these issues as it affects us all. We are keen to ensure that those who are worst-off in our society and those we help through the project, those seeking asylum in the UK and new refugees, that they are not forgotten in this period."

West End Refugee Service

WERS has announced the details of its AGM. It will be held on **Tuesday** 6th **December 2022 at 1pm at Summerhill Bowling Club, Winchester Terrace, Newcastle, NE4 6EH.** If you wish to attend, please let them know in advance. The report can be found at

https://www.wers.org.uk/agm-20202021. (This is the same page as the annual accounts and the minutes of last year's AGM.) It is an interesting read and details the achievements and the challenges of the past financial year, which was clearly impacted by the ongoing Covid pandemic. In this report they say "throughout the year we have provided support and opportunities to over 600 people seeking asylum and refugees. We formally registered 510 people who engaged with a range of WERS services. Others who were supported were helped with ad hoc support – food, toiletries, donations of clothes which did not require them to register with us. This number does not include dependants of beneficiaries. We supported people seeking sanctuary from 60 countries. 16% were from Iraq, 14% from Iran, other top nationalities supported include people from Eritrea, Syrian, Sudan. The people we supported were aged from 18 to 78 years. We saw 209 people who were familiar with our services and 301 people who were new to WERS - a significant increase of 119.7% in new registrations.

Throughout the year, we have also supported a more transient population of those housed in initial accommodation in disused hotels. Whilst many are there for months/years, there has also been frequent movement in and out of the region in this period.

We have continued to support people who are currently seeking asylum, those who

have received refugee protection/status and people who are destitute and have no recourse to public funds due to a negative decision on their asylum claim."

WERS are also working with many other organisations to LIFT the BAN and let people seeking asylum work in the community.

They are specifically appealing for shampoo, conditioner, shower gel, toothpaste, tooth brushes, deodorant, shaving gel, hand and bar soap, sanitary towels and nappies (especially larger sized ones). As part of their festive appeal they are also asking for new warm gloves and hats (mainly for men) and chocolate treats.

Justice and Peace Refugee Project

The need for support continues. In the last month they have welcomed a further 33 new clients in need of food to supplement their meagre allowance. The need for toothbrushes, toothpaste, shower gels, deodorants, shampoo, conditioners and washing powders as well as cooking oil, coffee and rice is as strong as ever. They stress that they are grateful for all the help; spiritual, physical and financial. The work of both these organisations continues throughout the year so please remember the staff, volunteers and service users this Christmas.

The Justice and Peace website quotes the words of Pope Francis,

"We cannot remain insensitive, our hearts deadened, before the misery of so many innocent people. We must not fail to weep. We must not fail to respond."





Here is the news from Great Bavington United Reformed Church for December and January:

Building repairs completed

Heritage Consolidation have completed the repairs to the church. This involved improving the ventilation in the roof space to reduce dampness and to keep the fabric of the church in good condition. The loft insulation has been replaced with sheep wool insulation which will keep the building warmer and is more environmentally friendly. The work was funded by grants from the Ray Wind Farm Community Fund, URC Northern Synod, the Northumbria Historic Churches Trust and the Congregational & General Charitable Trust, for which the church congregation is very grateful.

Now that the repairs are completed, the church is open again during the daytime for visitors.

Morpeth for Ukraine

Since May 2022 St. George's Church in Morpeth has been opening its doors on a Friday morning as a hub for Ukrainian refugees who have arrived in the area, together with their host families and plenty of volunteers under the banner of "Morpeth for Ukraine". These coffee mornings have also led to other activities being offered such as English language lessons and shared social gatherings with food and music.

Among those calling in back in July to offer help and introduce us to his own project was Simon Burnage, in the process of collecting humanitarian aid that he would drive across the Polish border and into Ukraine - his second such trip driving over 2,500km in 30 hours.

Freda is the name of the ex-supermarket delivery van donated to Simon to refurbish and transport a full load of aid to the besieged communities of Rivne, Lutsk and Kadyshche in Ukraine, and then for the van to be handed over to the local defence forces. The van was named in memory of the anonymous donator's mother. Together with Simon in the photograph are the Mayor of Rivne and a senior defence force officer.

The woman's son was wounded in combat, is now recovering and awaiting redeployment to the front. The beanie hats and balaclavas knitted by St. George's "Knit and Natter" group were much appreciated by her son and his comrades and prompted the village's own vintage needlework restoration group to send presents of their work back to the Morpeth knitters - to be displayed in church in the coming weeks.



Back in Morpeth, Simon is already planning yet another trip in the New Year. His intention this time is to prioritise the delivery of thermal underwear, hygiene and sanitary items, children's clothes and donations to buy building materials to help repair the little school in the village of Kadyshche in the Volyn Oblast.
