# A Message from our Minister, Revd Julian Sanders

Dear Friends,

Jingle Bells! Jingle Bells! I'm afraid you can't deny it but Christmas is coming, and despite what people might be saying it is not cancelled and remains one of the major festivals in our churches calendar. Though, this year I strongly suspect Christmas might feel very different than what we have become used to.

It is good to be reminded, then, that the reality of Christmas is a lot different from the commercial façade that is drummed into us each year in the shops and from the television. At Christmas God came into the world to tell us we don't need to shop for 'things' to make our lives complete. And the 'house' that Jesus was born in was not finely decorated and cosy, but bleak and dirty. Mary and Joseph were not surrounded by friends and family, but alone and in a strange place. And the Angels and Shepherds were not characters in a story told to entertain us, but a truth and a mystery to be lived.

The Angels speak of the 'holiness' of the one who was born in that stable, and the 'shepherds' speak of his earthliness. How these two, heaven and earth, come together in that little baby in the manger is one of profound mysteries we are called to consider at Christmas.

A group of children were performing a nativity play, and were encouraged to improvise and use their own words to add to some of the realism. Two shepherds approached the manger nervously, smiled at Mary, and shyly knelt down without a word. A third, bolder boy, looked into the manger, turned to Mary and with a smile said, "Isn't he like his dad!"

How profound is that? God in all his majesty embraces our earthliness in the mystery of Christmas. When we think of Jesus we think of the baby in the manger, or the Galilean teacher, or the silent sacrifice hanging on the cross. The Christmas story reminds us that Jesus, despite his humanity, was totally God too, in all his majestic glory. That is the mystery. Jesus is just like his Dad (God).

"Here in Jesus is a parallel like no other, closer and more striking than even perfectly identical twins, for the Son does not just resemble the Father; he is one with him, fully and completely making him known. To know Jesus is to know God, to look at his life is to see God at work, to experience his love is to be touched by God's love in turn." *Nick Fawcett* 

I hope that this Christmas, even if it is to be a Christmas without the traditions and the façade that we have come to love and look forward to, that you find time to sit and contemplate the mystery of this child born in a stable where heaven and earth meet. This person Jesus who was fully God and fully human. This baby who was just like his father in every way.

# **Refugees and Asylum Seekers November 2020**

# **West End Refugee Service**

Since last month's report there have been the autumn newsletter and WERS AGM with all the reports etc which goes with it. So in this report I can give a brief flavour of what has been happening but if you are interested in greater detail please go to their website at <a href="https://www.wers.org.uk">www.wers.org.uk</a>

One big piece of news from the AGM is that the previous day they had appointed a new Director, Hannah Barnes. Hannah has been working with WERS for some time and has been Acting Director, since June. During the meeting she spoke very enthusiastically about the work of WERS and the team of staff and volunteers who make WERS function.

The reports at the AGM detailed the amount of hard work that had been ongoing in the year 2019-20 so only included the first week or so of the lockdown, but the talks went on to stress how much work they had been able to continue doing, recently, albeit in different ways.

During the year 2019-20 they had had 70 volunteers who had provided between them 5000 house of support whether in the clothing store, acting as befrienders, working in Skillsmatch, support workers, gardeners etc. They had had 5065 contact episodes to provide support and advice. This had been with 510 different service users, 178 of whom were new to the service in that year. They had been able to make 62,399 hardship donations. 1668 people had been reached by Awareness Raising, especially in schools. This had also led to further donations in money and kind.

Due to the pandemic they have been working differently and now work in conjunction with the food banks, providing a delivery service where necessary. They have continued with their befriending but often done remotely. They managed to open face to face work again in August, two days a week, in a covid secure setting, sitting outside whenever possible.

Their festive appeal is for toiletries, socks and chocolates but these need to be with them by 1 December. But people can still make donations to the hardship fund for the festive appeal at <a href="https://www.justgiving.com/wers">https://www.justgiving.com/wers</a>. They also remind people they can sign up to support them through amazon smile or "giveasyoulive".

#### **Justice and Peace**

Over the past few months Justice and Peace has been developing closer working relationships with the St Vincent de Paul charity and the intention is that in the near future the project will move to the SVP site at Blackfriars in the New Bridge Street area of Newcastle.

This base will give them more space and will be more accessible. The work the centre has been reduced significantly throughout the pandemic as most of their volunteers are aged 70+, but they have continued to give out food vouchers to their refugee and asylum seeker contacts. This time has been used positively as they have been busy making plans for the future.

I am advised that the SVP centre works largely with homeless and destitute men and they have a functioning clothes store at the moment. So if anyone has men's clothing or sheets (but not duvets) which they wish to pass on arrangements could be made for this, but **not** via the garage. If you have goods to send please let me know and I can try and put you in touch with someone who could advise you on this. (margaretdbrock@aol.com)

# NOTES FROM THE MEETING OF THE NORTHERN SYNOD HELD BETWEEN 17 AND 31 OCTOBER 2020.

The Spring 2020 Northern Synod Meeting was cancelled due to the Covid 19 pandemic, but our resourceful national church accepted that "virtual" Synod Meetings would be perfectly acceptable so the Northern Synod "met" via Zoom on the mornings of Saturday 17<sup>th</sup> and 31<sup>st</sup> October. For the intervening fortnight, there was a Festival of Tents – virtual meeting places via Zoom, which included daily worship and two or three events to join such as policy proposals, safeguarding, ecumenical and inter-faith workings, children's work, and there was even a quiz, a treasure hunt and a concert. I understand that those who joined were inspired, informed, enthused and reconnected. If Synod does it again, we should all join in – I regret not doing so on this occasion.

The Moderator, Revd David Herbert welcomed everyone – I think there were approximately 60 participants and we had opening worship with prayers prepared by Carla Grosch-Miller. We heard of comings and goings and retirements from Synod Clerk, Melanie Campbell. Ordination anniversaries included Peter Rand 40, David Grosch-Miller 45 and Tony Ritchie 60. We also heard that it was Synod Officer, Andrew Atkinson's 50<sup>th</sup> Meeting (he deserves a medal!). Youth Intern, Amelia Turner, received the Lundy Award for two years service at Roker.

Safeguarding Adviser, Matt Knowles introduced the latest edition of Good Practice (5) and urged everyone to attend at least the basic level course of three. St George's Safeguarding person is Margaret Brock who can arrange for our members to attend.

In her report, Pastoral Committee Convener, Revd Joan Grindrod-Helmn said that Revd Dr Carla Grosch-Miller's term as Transitional Minister at St Andrew's, Monkseaton, has been extended due to Covid 19. Carla is working at 50% until the work is completed. Revds Lynda Coulthard and Ann Shepherdson have been re-invited to serve in SENEA with the approval of the SENEA Area Meeting (Resolutions 2 and 3 carried). The Holy Island Project has been granted a third term as a Special Category Ministry until 2026.

Sadly resolutions 4 and 5 were carried - "giving thanks for the faithful life and service through the years, Synod concurs with the decision of the Church Meetings to close Berwick United Reformed Church and Crookham United Reformed Church."

Northern Synod Trust Convener, David Grosch-Miller, introduced retired accountant Willie Duncan as the new Trust Secretary, following the retirement of Andrew Hamnett after eight years as Company Secretary and almost ten on the Board. He recorded our gratitude for Andrew's wealth of experience and his contribution to the work of the Trust.

David emphasized that the Trust is committed to support congregations as best as they can and he also reassured Synod that there is no threat to pensions. Following discussion, Resolution 9 was carried: "Synod, being representative of Local Churches and part of the whole Church, affirms the Church's commitment to the pensions promises already made, and wishes any consideration of future pension arrangements for the Church's Ministers of Word and Sacraments, Church-Related Community Work Ministers, missionaries and staff to keep clearly in mind:

- a. The Church's warm gratitude for the commitment, gifts and service of those who work among us and serve in our name;
- b. The Church's desire to deal with these people honourably in their retirement:
- c. The Church's desire to act as a responsible employer, for the people of the Church employs and for our stipendiary office-holders.

(NOTE: full reports and resolutions are on the Synod website. Some Resolutions were taken en bloc).

David Dick is preparing a new Synod website, reflecting our aims of Belonging, Caring, Growing Faith – new branding to reflect our core beliefs. Visitors will be able to find their nearest church by entering a postcode.

During worship we had reflections from General Secretary of the URC, Revd John Bradbury, (which may be seen on the Northern Synod website) and the Moderator closed the meeting with prayer.



# Eglantyne Jebb - founder of 'Save the Children'

Here is a modern-day saint whose compassion and determination has saved literally millions of lives. Eglantyne did not begin as an obvious 'mover and shaker' of people. Born in Shropshire in 1876, she grew up in Ellesmere, studied history at Lady Margaret Hall in Oxford, taught at Marlborough, and then resigned as she was not physically robust.

Eglantyne moved to live with her mother in Cambridge, and it would have been so easy to settle for a life of peaceful obscurity. But she was a Christian, and at Oxford she had developed a passion for social concerns, so this compassion now drove her to take action. She began in 1906 by publishing research on the poverty she'd found in Cambridge. Then in 1912 the Balkan Wars broke out, and Eglantyne left Cambridge for Macedonia. Her months among the refugees led her to decide that long-term constructive aid was more effective than short-term handouts.

The First World War left Eglantyne horrified by the prolonged Allied blockade on Germany and Austria-Hungary, which even after Armistice meant starvation for millions of civilians, especially children.

And so in1919 Eglantyne and her sister Dorothy Buxton helped found the 'Fight the Famine' Council, which wanted to end the blockade and establish a League of Nations. One day during a rally in Trafalgar Square, Eglantyne was arrested for distributing a leaflet showing starving children which read: "Our blockade has caused this – millions of children are starving to death."

She ended up in court and was fined, but the judge was so impressed with Eglantyne's commitment to children that he himself paid her fine. His money became the first donation to Save the Children, the new charity just set up by Eglantyne and Dorothy.

Save the Children was officially launched at the Albert Hall in May 1919, with the aim of helping the starving civilians of central Europe. It was a success, raising £400,000 in that first year alone. When in the autumn of 1921 Russia was facing famine, Save the Children chartered a cargo ship, the SS Torcello, to carry 600 tons of lifesaving food and medical supplies to Russia – saving hundreds of thousands of lives. By 1922 Save the Children had become one of Britain's biggest charities. Eglantyne's Declaration of the Rights of the Child, written in 1923, was adopted by the League of Nations the following year. The present-day UN Convention on the Rights of the Child is derived from it.

But ten years of running Save the Children had sapped Eglantyne's fragile strength, and she died in Geneva in 1928, aged only 52.

# **Silent Night**

This much-loved carol comes from Austria, where it was first sung as *Stille Nacht*, *heilige Nacht* on Christmas Eve, 1818. It was written by Father Joseph Mohr, a young priest at St Nicholas parish church, in the village of Oberndorf bei Salzburg. As Christmas 1818 approached, he asked the local schoolmaster, Franz Xaver Gruber, to compose a melody for his carol. Gruber was organist in the nearby village of Arnsdorf, and so was happy to oblige. On Christmas Eve they presented the carol to the church during the midnight mass. The carol went on

to become loved world-wide; and the version sung by Bing Crosby is the third best-selling single of all time.

I am sorry I was not alive during that wonderful four-year period when Oliver Cromwell abolished Christmas; no Christmas parties, no carol services, no cards to send and no frantic last-minute shopping. That man was a hero. Planning for Christmas at St James' normally starts on 2<sup>nd</sup> January. By Easter, the flowers for church have been carefully chosen to be colour coordinated, and the seating plans and table decorations for the Christmas party have been allocated (with nominated reserves in case someone should inconveniently die in the intervening eight months). Long before summer is over, the tree lights have been tested, music for the 9 Lessons and Carols Service has been chosen and the service sheets printed. Way before the dark nights set in, car parking attendants will have been found, those who are to light all the candles will have been rehearsed to perfection and the brass lectern has had its annual polish. We do not do spontaneity at St James the Least of All. If ever there was a service when time for something unexpected had to be allowed, its place would be announced in the order of service, how long the unexpected thing would happen for would have been decided by a committee, and who was to be spontaneous would have been allocated on a rota.

But the one person none of these well-meaning, efficient, committed organisers can control is the Rector. You could call it a staff perk.

Carols will (accidentally, of course) be announced in the wrong order; if verse 3 was to be omitted, I announce it will be verse 4. This keeps the organist on his toes while the choir hovers on the point of a collective nervous breakdown. At the Christmas supper, my introductory welcome speech and extensive grace make those in the kitchen wonder if the vegetables being boiled should better be served as thick soup.

I offer the helpful suggestion that the tree, having been installed and decorated in the chancel, may perhaps look better in the sanctuary and I turn all the heating off throughout the season, explaining that it will help the flowers to last. All Services will start five minutes early (was my watch rather fast?) so I can look disapprovingly at those still coming in while we are singing the first carol and making it clear that I think they had spent too long in the pub next door. And so we all reach Christmas morning, with 12 months of planning having gone yet again slightly awry, with parishioners exhausted and I exhilarated at the chaos that has been created with such ease. Mr Cromwell, your spirit lives on.
















# **Safeguarding Training**

Earlier this year the URC published new policy and good practice guidance for safeguarding children, young people and adults at risk. It is called Good Practice 5. Work has been ongoing to update our safeguarding procedures in line with this.

To support Good Practice 5 three levels of training are being arranged. The first level is designed for anyone and everyone within the church. You do not need to have a specific church responsibility to do this basic level training and it doesn't matter whether you have never done any training before or if you have done some and feel you could do with a refresher. It lasts for no longer than 2 hours (with a comfort break) and can be done from the comfort of your own armchair at home. All you need is a device with internet access and a camera so you can join in with other course members.

The training is being done via Zoom by Matt Knowles, the Synod Safeguarding Lead. If you are interested and don't know how to get on to Zoom, Matt will help you do it.

Every session is relaxed and informal and you can ask questions throughout. At the end you will get a certificate and it is FREE.

The next sessions are on Monday 11th January at 1.00pm and Wednesday 20th January. at 10.00am. If you are interested in these or other dates in the future please let me know. Everyone is welcome to do the training. Matt would love everyone to do it.

Training is also being arranged for level 2 which is for people with specific roles in the church including elders, junior church leaders, leaders of organisations etc. Level 3 is for people who require more detailed knowledge. If you are interested in either of these courses do let me know and I will contact you when dates are available.


