

A Message from our Minister

Dear Friends,

When I arrived at St Georges the planned alterations to the entrance of the church were well underway, and though it continues to split opinion in the church, we look forward now to the work that is to be done in transforming the entrance to our building. Glass doors which perhaps allow those passing by a glimpse at what goes on within the church, and perhaps give an indication of the openness of this church community in welcoming those from the outside into our church family.

Our doors especially give visible signs to the people around us. Doorways are significant places. They are places of transition, going from one thing to another. Doorways to other worlds feature heavily in science fiction and fantasy writing in which this transition from the ordinary to the extraordinary express something of the human yearning to transcend this world and, perhaps, escape the monotony or suffering that we might experience. When we invite people in through our doors, we invite them to move from where they are, to a new place. For those who find themselves lost, and perhaps in need of healing, we invite people in to a place where hope and restoration may be found.

At this time of year, we think about transition from one year to another. Advent is the beginning of a new year on the Christian calendar, and we begin this year by looking forward to God breaking into our lives in a new way. And as the bells ring out the old and ring in the New Year after our Christmas celebrations, we think especially of the transition we make. Moving from that which is past to that which is future, excited by the promise of opportunity that might come our way in the year to come.

"Here I am! I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in and eat with that person, and they with me." Rev 3:20

So next time you go past the church, take a good look at the porch and the doors, and consider what message they might be giving to those who walk past. But also take time to consider those who come through our doors throughout any given week, and how they might be transformed by that transition from "that place" to "this place".

And perhaps the words of the psalmist will come to mind:


"lift up your heads, you gates;

We will raise awareness, educate and positively challenge discrimination and negative perceptions towards asylum seekers and refugees.

Justice and Peace Refugee Project

In their latest newsletter it says

"It is now 18 years since the project first opened on just one day a week; since then we have grown year-on-year evolving as needs demand. The services we offer are currently under considerable pressure due to increased numbers. Until 2016, we were typically registering 20-25 new people every month. However, over the past two years, that figure is more typically 50-60 and has reached 90 on occasion. Thanks to the continued support of our donor parishes/schools, we continue to be able to support all of our clients but we are now beginning to struggle under the increasing weight of numbers. We urge our regular supporters to keep up their parish food collections and to increase them if this is at all possible. We would also ask that parishes and schools not already involved think about doing so. Please get in touch with us to see if you are able to help us in any way."

The newsletter also provides details of their Destitute Asylum Fund. It explains:-

"This is a special account which is dedicated to help our destitute clients. Currently 120 of our clients qualify for a payment of £25 each month.... This year we expect to pay out over £30,000 from the Destitute Asylum Fund. Other costs, such as building rental and purchase of equipment come from the Diocesan Justice & Peace account. This is quite separate from the Destitute Asylum Fund."

Ethical Christmas presents

How much damage to the earth will we manage to do this Christmas? Those hundreds of millions of presents we are going to buy come from somewhere – usually raw resources. Are the presents worth the strain on our already struggling planet? Here are some alternative presents, that are eco-friendly, useful, and fairly traded.

Christian Aid (christianaid.org.uk/christmaspresents) invites supporters to send them a donation, and in return, they will send a 'lively' personalised card to your friend or relations, describing the gift you have chosen to give on their behalf. **Send a Cow** (sendacow.org/gifts) also invites supporters to send a donation for a range of practical gifts, for use in helping people from Ethiopia to Zambia. Traidcraft (traidcraftshop.co.uk) offers everything from bamboo tights to clocks to food and cosmetics.

WaterAid (shop.wateraid.org) provides sanitation equipment (such as taps to promote hand washing) to villages in Africa, Asia or Central America. The person you nominate will receive a card to let them know this has been done in their name.

World Vision (musthavegifts.org) offers you the choice of sending various specific items from mosquito nets to garden tools, all of which they say are specifically asked for and needed.

With WWF (wwf.org.uk) you can adopt a wild animal, from a dolphin to an orang-utan. WWF will send your nominated person an adoption certificate and even cuddly toy.

Will you get a 'thanks' for your Christmas presents?

After Christmas, what? Just blank silence? Or a 'thank-you' note for that gift? A survey by the insurers Ecclesiastical has found that 60 per cent of 25-to-34-year-olds said they would NOT write a thank-you note because they found writing uncomfortable, or were embarrassed by their handwriting, spelling or grammar, or just did not know what to say. It seems that saying 'thank you' can be the hardest word for many in this age-group. Yet people who receive written thank you notes for their gifts say that the letters make them so much happier for having gone to the trouble of choosing and sending a gift. And even a personal 'thank-you' via social media is much welcomed.


I write on behalf of Sanctuary Network Morpeth to thank the members of St George's Church for your donation of £500 to support our work with local asylumseeking refugees.




Stamps
