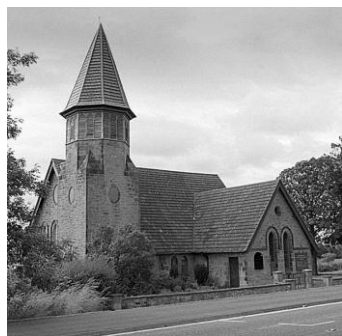

Dear Friends,

February is the season of "Love". You cannot go anywhere over the next couple of weeks without being bombarded with symbols and messages of undying love. Stores will be awash with 'hearts' emblazoned all around the place reminding us that this is a season for lovers.

But of course, we know that we do not love with just our hearts:

"thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind, and with all thy strength"

Mark 12:30

So why do we focus on the heart as such a symbol of love? Why are the stores not decorated with brains and souls (whatever that may be) and muscles too?

Well, since the book of Genesis the heart has been the place which guides our actions, the evil thoughts of men were situated in the heart (Genesis 6:5) and with the Hebrews in slavery, Pharaoh's heart was repeatedly hardened against them.

Aristotle considered the heart to be the place where thought, reason and emotion were situated in a person, while the Roman physician Galen located passions in the liver, reason in the brain, and emotions in the heart. It is perhaps this that has remained in our western culture where the heart remains a symbol of our emotional love.

In the quote from Mark's gospel, Jesus takes one of the laws from the book of Deuteronomy. The love expressed in the Deuteronomic laws is the love between two parties of the covenant, much as the love expressed during February may be between a married couple, who too have covenanted together. This kind of love is much more than mere emotion. Jesus' command expresses this love that comes from the whole of a person, mind, soul and spirit, and that in love we offer all of ourselves to the other.

The "soul" represents in a way our life and commitment, the "heart" and "mind" our emotions and thoughts, and "strength" represents that which gives us substance, our wealth and property. So John Calvin preaches in one of his sermons:

"Thou shalt love God with all thy soul, is as much as to say thou shalt not spare thy life for the love of thy God...Thou shalt love thy God with all thy mind or heart...so as a man should prefer God above all other things...and finally, thou shalt love God with all thy strength, imparted among them, that thou must love him with all thy substance and with all thy goods, as if the case required that thou shouldest be impoverished."

So during this month when loving couples express their love for each other, let us be reminded of the God whom we love. As married couples celebrate their commitment to each other, let us celebrate the God who is deeply committed to us. And as we are bombarded with images of hearts, let us be reminded that our love for God goes beyond mere emotions, and that we love with our mind, and soul and strength too!

Cheque Donation £273.46.

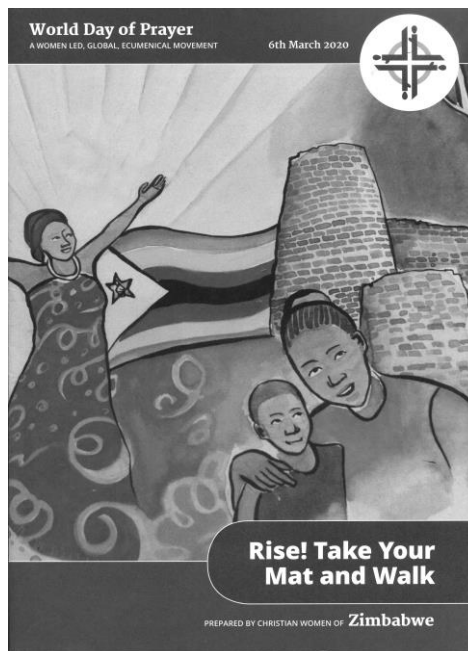
Thank you for your recent cheque donation from collections at St George's United Reformed Church – it is very much appreciated.

Word Search for February

In New Testament times 40 days old was an important age for a baby boy: it was when they made their first 'public appearance'. Mary, like all good Jewish mothers, went to the Temple with Jesus, her first male child - to 'present him to the Lord'. At the same time, she, as a new mother, was 'purified'. Thus we have the Festival of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple, 40 days after Christmas. Jesus is described in the Bible as the Light of the World, and so early Christians developed the tradition of lighting many candles in celebration of this day. The Church also fell into the custom of blessing the year's supply of candles for the church on this day - hence the name, Candlemas. The story can be found in Luke 2:22-40.

Simeon's great declaration of faith and recognition of who Jesus was is of course found in the Nunc Dimittis, which is embedded in the Office of Evening Prayer in the West.

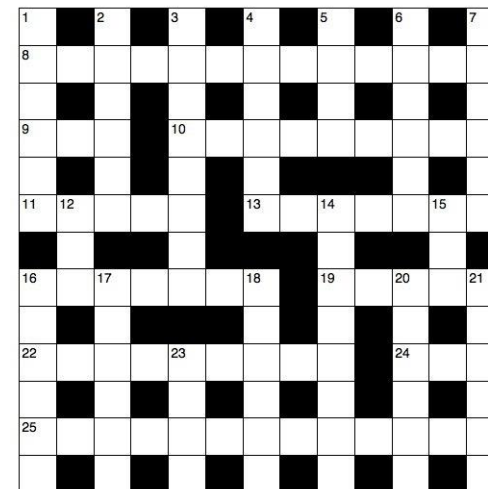

Christmas Tree Festival 2019

The 2019 Multiple Sclerosis Research and Relief Fund Christmas Tree Festival was held in the Church Sanctuary on 6th and 7th December. This was well supported by local businesses, community groups and organisations within the church.

Once again there were some very talented exhibits with 22 trees shown. This year MSR&R treated the festival as a means of bringing the work of the Fund to the attention of local folk and not as a fund-raiser. In spite of this almost £1000 was raised by donations and the small raffle.

On Friday 6th Dec the Charity welcomed 160 children from local Infant Schools & Nurseries and the Church resounded to happy laughter of children searching the trees and the surroundings for elves and the occasional knitted angel.

They also listened to a narration of the Christmas story and in the Drysdale Room had a whale of a time with Christmas games led by a member of staff of "Little Movers", a leading provider of pre-school dance and movement classes in the North. The Mayor officially opened the event on the Friday evening which was very well supported. The audience was treated to a concert by members of The Mid-Northumberland Chorus, Oboist Emma Straughan and Heaton Voices from Newcastle.

The Church was then open to the public on the Saturday 7th throughout the day with a steady stream of visitors including children, who had visited on the Friday, bringing parents and grandparents to view the excellent trees. During the morning all visitors were directed upstairs to the Ladies Coffee Morning which proved to be of benefit to church funds.

About half of the trees were retained and graced our Life Remembered Service on Dec 9th, our Joint Nativity Service with Morpeth Methodist Church on Sunday Dec 15th and also our Community Carol Service on Monday 16th.

Once again we would like to thank all those who contributed in any way to this very successful event.

In memoriam

In November Widdrington URC lost, in swift succession, an old and valued friend, and then our oldest member.

Michael Spears was a good friend to us, conducting services for us on a number of occasions. His sermons and talks, illustrated with events from his earlier careers, especially as a bus driver, were always interesting and amusing. He continued to conduct our Christmas Day service until only a few years ago, when his health sadly deteriorated. He will be much missed in Hadstone and Broomhill.

Joyce Waddell joined our congregation as soon as she moved into Ulgham. It was to be her retirement home, but sadly her husband died just before the move, so we never knew him. Joyce quickly became a faithful member of the congregation, missing very few Sundays until a couple of years ago. Joyce was also an enthusiastic member of the Friendship Club and the Bowls Club (both organisations that long predeceased her). Many of us remember with affection the summer evenings playing bowls on her (or Elizabeth's) lawn: not perhaps bowling green quality. A special skill was required, quite different from the carpet in the hall! Joyce was an interesting lady. I was aware that she had been a

driver in the ATS in the war. I was fascinated to learn also of her career as a textile designer.

Last year, sadly, Joyce had a fall at home, which put an end to her independent living. She died last November, aged 96
