

Notes by the Way February 2024 by Revd Stuart Brock

I have been intrigued of late by the number of TV programmes springing up on several channels inviting viewers to declutter and deep clean what appear to be rather untidy homes. The advice is usually offered by people who seem to have some expertise on the way to do this. They offer techniques to overcome what in some cases appears to be an inability to get started, daunted by the sheer dimensions of the problem.

For various reasons we are beginning a general clear-out and clean up in our house – what, in days gone by would have been classed as a 'Spring-clean.' Except it isn't Spring yet and it is more than a clean up. Another reason for this exercise is the fact that we have just collected so much stuff in this house over the last 20 years we no longer have space to store it. Again, the necessity of making some space is also due to the fact that I am not noted for my tidiness and books and papers have a habit of taking over every available space and surface. Moreover, our four grown up children have only recently bought their own properties after years of renting so that their accumulated belongings, some still in packing boxes, can be transferred from our garage to their respective homes. But much of what needs sorting is the sheer amount of things that we have kept in case they might come in useful on some day in the future. Needless to say not much of this has happened and the hoarding instinct has won out in the battle to clear some retrievable living space. A friend of ours, a bit obsessive about tidiness has a rule that anything in her house that has not been used for two years is either handed on to someone else who can use it, or is thrown out to the skip. She is a very determined lady!

As I think about what there is to do and how much time and commitment it will entail it seems to me that there is a parable here of our living in general. We gain and then keep so much unnecessary junk, surrounding ourselves with material belongings that we think will keep us satisfied and secure for the future. They don't necessarily do so. We need to find a way of making space for the essentials which include time for developing and renewing our faith and loving others in our families, church and community.

There is also a positive approach to clearing out. In sorting one of the boxes in the garage I came across a number of documents, photos and artefacts left by my late mother who died in 2005. These mementos included some photos from a holiday on which she had joined us. There were also one or two older pictures and letters she had received from friends at the time of my birth.

There were some of her school reports. Perhaps more surprising were that she had kept copies of school reports on myself and my brother – documents which I can remember worrying about in case they said hard things about our progress or lack of it. My mother had clearly kept almost every extant record of family life she possessed. Then there were records of Sunday School scripture exams involving about 300 children at a time, some from churches which had their own considerable numbers of children attending week by week. All of which sheds light on the past offering a glimpse of a very different era from today's. So clearing out the debris and clutter of our lives can be a real eye opener. Treasure hides among the rubbish. It can be a stimulus to our understanding of the many ways in which God has acted in our times and our experience. It can also be the very boost we need to start the daunting task of discerning what is unimportant and what really is essential.

Refugees February 2024

A New Year has dawned and still the attempts to deport asylum seekers to Rwanda continues. Still desperate people are putting their lives on the line in search of safety.

West End Refugee Project

WERS held its AGM in December. Its Annual Report referred to the challenging environment & said "Current global conflicts & climate emergency are leading to an increased number of people seeking asylum arriving in the UK. Once here, they are met with domestic, social & political tensions. What they need is not just our compassion, but also our unwavering support."

WERS is currently providing regular garden volunteering opportunities, drop ins, a cooking group, art & craft activities, a weekly welcome session & a women's dance group. They also have a space photography session due shortly.

Their new project, The Seven Bridges project at Dance City (Temple Street, Newcastle) has started. Here in collaboration with the Head Chef, the menu is being thoughtfully crafted and regularly updated to highlight the diverse techniques and traditions of the dedicated volunteers.

The aim is not only to showcase their rich culinary contributions but also provide a platform for them to enhance existing skills, acquire new ones, and gain valuable experience that serves as a stepping stone towards future employment opportunities. Clients who volunteer are offered 6-week placements at the café so that they can:

- gain experience of working in a professional café
- receive one to one support from the Head Chef
- access training for Level 2 Food Hygiene and Safety Certificate
- introduce their favourite food to the pub.

Justice and Peace Project

J&P have recently published their latest Annual Report. In this they say they held 99 client sessions in the year to 31 July 2023 and had 3547 client visits to the centre (more than 1000 more than the previous year).

They have given out supermarket vouchers to the value of nearly £24k to destitute clients & a further £4k of vouchers at Christmas & refugee week. They have provided over £90K worth of food bags. To help fund this activity they have received nearly £50k in donations & £41k in grant funding.

David Archbald, Chair of the J&P Project Steering Group reports that "the Tyneside area remains a major dispersal area for the Home Office and, with the low levels of Government support, plus the cost-of-living crisis, the support we offer is more important than ever.

Effectively we find there are 3 categories of clients: there are those receiving some Home Office support whilst being accommodated in hotels, those living in flats or houses funded by the Home Office and people who have no recourse to public funds as their claim to asylum has been refused. This latter group are truly destitute and homeless."

He says "We aim to mitigate the hostile environment often promoted by some politicians and sections of society. As Pope Francis said, we should be "accompanying and managing waves of migration as best we can, constructing bridges and not walls." The generosity of our volunteers and donors demonstrates that many people do indeed wish to build bridges, not walls, between communities."

He goes on to say "The project has now been in existence for over 22 years, and it seems it is needed now more than ever. Thank you for the support you have given and continue to offer. It is truly appreciated by all those who use the Project." As ever your support for these projects is welcomed.

We weep with broken hearts as we hear of hospitals, mosques, churches, and schools damaged and destroyed by this war. In Gaza, there is no safe place. There is no refuge. There is no escape."
