

Notes by the Way by Revd Stuart Brock

I guess like most folk reading this you, like us, get a lot of unsolicited communications through the letterbox, on line and on TV. Many of these are adverts for all sorts of trades and companies but we also get plastic bags which invite us to help particular charities by filling them with unwanted used clothes or objects to be resold for some good cause or other. The number of these is so large that we couldn't possibly fill them all, even if we were engaged in a grand clear-out or spring clean.

Then we are reminded of the endless needs of so many people across the world. Regular TV adverts for many different charities are a constant reminder of the suffering which is the 'normal' experience of people in dire poverty. We hear and see heart rending stories of the appalling conditions they are forced to endure. The adverts often convey pictures of children whose lives are blighted through the absence of nourishing food and clean drinking water. It is hard to ignore them. They pull at our heartstrings and touch our compassion. We want to respond to every one of them as we know that what they represent is only a fraction of the poverty and need that is out there. Add to this the unremitting footage on TV news of the effect on humans of natural disasters hurricanes, tornadoes, earthquakes or volcanos and we might well be totally overwhelmed with feelings of frustration, helplessness and despair. When we get to this point, we are approaching what has been labelled 'compassion fatigue' where the problems are so intractable we cannot see any solutions and believe that nothing we can do will change the situation and in our fatigue we come to the conclusion that there is no point in doing anything anymore.

So what to do? Certainly we are not going to change the world just on our own. What we can offer is so small a contribution compared with the scale of need. But we shouldn't give up. When we add up all the individual responses to these huge problems we discover there is strength in numbers. What we despair to achieve in our own lives, by joining with others, becomes a reality. I am writing this in Christian Aid Week. This annual event is a reminder that through dedicated organisations and the teams that run them, along with the enthusiastic volunteers collecting on the street or running other fundraising events, many individuals pulling together can make a huge difference. We know this because Christian Aid tells us it is so. Their publicity is peppered with stories of people and communities transformed by the giving of those of us fortunate to live in reasonable prosperity and security.

There may have been a reluctance recently for people to give as generously as in the past. This has been put down to the COVID emergency fundamentally changing the way people view their priorities in life. It may also be a reflection of the cost of living crisis which has left many people struggling to pay their heating and food bills.

Whatever the principle reason, charities too are struggling. They aren't immune from the factors that affect all of us. So I would suggest that now is not the time to let fatigue overcome our compassion but to maintain our commitment to the poor, the dispossessed and the vulnerable.

Refugees June 2023

I thought this month people might like to hear from a few of the asylum seekers themselves who are being helped by the two organisations, as well as some more general information.

West End Refugee Service

One asylum seeker reports that WERS "saved my life. Without the support work team, I don't know what would have happened. No-one had told me that I should have attended an interview two years before. She contacted the Tribunal for me and found out the situation which made a big difference."

"I would recommend WERS. They help a lot and have a lot of information. It's a good place to come."

Since being helped by the Support Work team this asylum seeker has participated in trips through skillsmatch, making new friends and improving his English. He has recently signed up to become a WERS drop in volunteer. Another asylum seeker says "WERS has allowed me to get to know others who speak the same language as I do and therefore make some friends. Also, because of all the volunteering WERS has helped me get in to, it has helped me see Newcastle as a city that I am new to. It gave me opportunities to get outside rather than be in the house all the time. It makes me feel like I am going out to work and then afterwards, returns to my house. I also feels that the volunteering I do enables me to 'give back' to the city".

WERS has recently been involved in a visit to Alnmouth Friary, where they explored the gardens & the village and played rounders on the beach. They have also been to Hartlepool Sixth Form College to be involved in their Community Engagement Cultural Festival. They continue with activities to challenge the proposed Migration Bill.

Justice and Peace Project

The English lessons which are being provided to clients by volunteers at the project are resulting in significant improvements in their language skills. A client from Afghanistan who has been attending lessons since they re-started last year recently expressed her gratitude to the project. She reported, "When I started attending classes, I was clueless. Over time, I have better English skills, where I can now write, read and communicate effectively."

Due to generous donations and grants received, the project was able to increase the amount of the supermarket voucher they give out from £35 to £40 in April. Azad, the Project Co-ordinator is also working with agencies to further develop their ability to signpost clients to receive legal advice and support. He and a volunteer have also attended a meeting to provide views to the Commission on Integration on the asylum system and what can be done to put integration at the heart of the government policy on refugees and asylum seekers. Views from clients were also contributed at this meeting. J&P says "Volunteers are very much the life-blood of the operation. They work across the project, whether packing bags, lugging trollies, undertaking admin work or dealing face-to-face with clients and other visitors." Currently J&P are specifically looking for volunteers to assist them on Wednesdays. Anyone who is interested should contact Azad Hasan, Project Co-ordinator at azad.hasan@diocesehn.org.uk or 07407 091184.

I have noticed recently that donations to WERS and Justice & Peace have declined significantly. I realise that things are difficult for many people and there are many calls on our income. If you can manage to support these worthy causes do please continue to do so in whatever way you can. Thank you



It was lovely to hear one of my Holy Island hymns played during the worship in the place where it was recorded over 25 years ago and to see the recently renovated St Cuthbert's look so fresh and new.



I also enjoyed meeting up again with some old friends, including Sandy and Kath Ogilvie (Ian Ogilvie's parents) and hear how the family are doing. The theme of the reflective afternoon was Ebb Tide, Full Tide and was led by Roberta Ritson, a student at Scottish College coming to the end of her training for non-stipendiary ministry. 

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

It truly was a memorable day for us all. A huge thank you to Julian for all the planning and to his little band of helpers





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

Wordsearch for June



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



Ian Gordon

Ian Gordon died on 14th April.

lan was involved in the community. By profession a civil engineer, he was involved in road building projects both locally and nationally, including the Newcastle Western Bypass (known in the family as 'Uncle Ian's road'). He was awarded an OBE for his service. He sat on the parole board at Acklington prison. He was on the board at Nomad Housing, and later on the board of Woodhorn Museum. After retirement he became a Justice of the Peace. He was involved with his family. He helped out on the various farms of family members. I several times encountered him at West Stobswood dressed in a green boiler suit and wellies. He was very fond and supportive of his many nieces and nephews and their children who will remember him with affection. He was involved in his Church. His family has long been prominent in Widdrington Presbyterian, now Widdrington United Reformed Church. As such, lan contributed to the practical upkeep of the church with grass cutting, decorating and other maintenance tasks. He was an Elder for many years until a promotion meant that he had to spend weekdays in London. He was the church organist for even longer, continuing until pancreatic cancer caused him to stop. He played every Sunday until a change in service time from afternoon to morning gave him a monthly week off for what was nominally 'family service'. He also knew exactly what to do with a screwdriver when the organ keys were stuck and 'siphoning'. In fact he last played the organ in October last year when illness left the worship team without an organist, so they were sharing the playing while also delivering the service. Ian stepped in after the second hymn, which was greatly appreciated by all. He rather enjoyed the experience. He also used to lead the church choir, which when I came to Widdrington was a small group who sang for Christmas and Easter. Ian was torn between being our only bass, and our only competent accompanist. He patiently recorded the tenor line onto Don Short's little red cassette recorder. In 2014 Ian developed pancreatic cancer. Against the odds he survived the treatment, which included the removal of his pancreas, making him a type one (insulin dependent) diabetic: a sudden change in lifestyle for one of his age. His independence curtailed, his family rallied round as he had so often done for them.

We thank God for his life and service, and pray for God's care and comfort for his family and friends. He will be missed.
