#### A message from our Minister, Revd Julian Sanders

#### Dear Friends

It has been said often that we are living through 'strange times' – times that for many can be exciting, to some it has come as some sort of relief, for others it brings monotony, to some their normal routines continue, to some it nurses despair and despondency as to what the future might hold.

Those early followers of Jesus would have faced the same range of emotions following the resurrection. For them life would not be the same again, as everything they thought they knew about God and the world was turned upside down – death was not the end, God was not distant, Jesus was not just some bloke with a knack for teaching. For them they faced the despair of losing Jesus, and although Jesus kept appearing among them and being with them, it was not the same and they were having to face the fact that he would return to the Father. They faced their mission, God's mission, alone with all the excitement and anxiety and danger that that brought with it. We see the disciples hiding away, filled with peace, told not to fear, excited about sharing the good news – such is the range of emotions and feelings during their strange times.

We, perhaps, can recognise the range of emotions and feelings that come and go as we face these 'strange times'. That is only natural, and we will all cope with the situations we find ourselves in, in our own ways. But I wanted to assure that you are not in this alone, and that if you are struggling to cope with the situation, then do please contact me, or any of the elders of the church, and just tell us how you are feeling. We may not be able to do anything, but I do know that sharing how you are feeling with others is vitally important and can go a long way to actually healing some of that despair.

I am hopeful for the future. When we first went into 'lock down' I was struggling with feelings of despair – not being able to conceive how business could survive, how food production could continue, how society would hold together....all those things. But those feelings have passed and I am hopeful for what might emerge from this new life that comes after this time of 'hibernation'. I am hopeful for the ways in which society might emerge from its isolation with a renewed sense of community and a greater valuing of each other.

I am hopeful for the ways in which material things, which seemed such a bedrock of people's lives, will have been replaced with things that hold much greater value.

I am hopeful that people will have found time to listen to the silence, and find within themselves that divine voice that whispers and struggles to be heard amidst the chaos of everyday living.

The poet Yehuda Amichai writes this:

From the place where we are right flowers will never grow in the spring. The place where we are right is hard and trampled like a yard, but doubts and love dig up the world like a mole, a plow.

The prophet Jeremiah puts it like this:

"For this is what the LORD says to the men of Judah and Jerusalem:

"Break up your unplowed ground,

and do not sow among the thorns"

Jeremiah 4:3

Each of those writers talk about the truth that anyone who owns an allotment, or garden, or farm knows – that dry hard ground needs to be broken up in order for things to grow. I am hopeful that during these 'strange times' the dry hard ground that was the foundation of many peoples lives, will be being broken up. The 'hard and trampled' places which we always thought were 'right' are being dug up by doubt and love, and in this soft ground new flowers will bloom. I see some of that as I see people passing each other on the street and acknowledging each other with a 'hello' instead of putting their head down and rushing past. I see some of that with neighbours standing at the end of the drive having conversations with each other. I see some of that in the delight in faces as people connect with each other over video calls. I see some of that as neighbours stand outside clapping together for those who are involved in caring for the weakest among us. I see some of that in the new and creative ways in which people are reaching out to others, sharing their lives with each other, and discovering new talents that are hidden deep with themselves.

I am hopeful for the future because of the truth we find in the Bible. That out of nothing comes light, out of slavery comes freedom, out of exile comes homecoming, out of the tomb comes resurrection and out of despair comes hope. Whenever people face 'strange times' what emerges is something new. Whenever the accepted 'right' gets turned on its head there comes the possibility of seeing our lives in a new way.

As you spend time in your garden, in your home, in your own thoughts during this time – I pray that you might dig over the unplowed ground of your lives, and open yourselves up to the new life that grows. As we emerge from our hibernation – I pray that hard and well trampled paths of the past might be broken up, so that a new way of living discovered. With every blessing,

#### West End Refugee Fund May 2020

WERS reports that it has had to adjust a lot of its services in the light of the Covid-19 pandemic. They are advising clients to access advice and support over the telephone (10am – noon Monday – Friday). They are also making regular calls to their most vulnerable clients. All their volunteering roles which require face to face contact have been paused, but befriending pairs are remaining in contact via phone, WhatsApp, video calls etc. They are also currently recruiting, from their trained group of volunteers, people to become remote befrienders to support this work and may shortly be looking to recruit more remote befrienders. So if anyone is interested in becoming a remote befriender with WERS you should email volunteers@wers.org.uk to register interest and to request an application form.

They are also asking people to donate to the Hardship Fund to support their most vulnerable clients who may be unwell or may need to self isolate. Details of how to make a regular donation are available on their website (www.wers.org.uk). One off payments can be made by cheque and sent to West End Refugee Service, St Philip's Vicarage, St Philip's Close, Arthur's Hill, Newcastle upon Tyne, NE4 5JE. Gift aid forms to accompany donations can also be found on their website.

#### **Justice and Peace Project**

I have an email update from Helen Woodland, Project Worker at the J&P Project, who says:-

"Hello everyone,

I hope that you are well and managing to cope with the 'strange new world' we find ourselves living in. John, myself and the Management Team at the Refugee Project have been continuing to work to provide a service to our most vulnerable clients.

The Project Management Team has asked me to relay the following update:

When we were last in touch, the plan was that the project was remaining open – although with restricted hours and focussing solely on financial support to destitute clients.

From then things moved quickly - the Summerhill Grove premises had to close and, unfortunately, our plans to operate out of St Mary's Cathedral café did not meet with police approval.

The positive development since then is that we have now established a mechanism for sending out 'digital vouchers' to the mobile phones of those destitute clients for whom we have contact details – and we are using various means to get the others to contact us. The vouchers (for either Tesco or ASDA) allow recipients to purchase goods to the value of £30 in the relevant supermarket.

The food we have available at the Project is being made available to similar local agencies to distribute to those who are struggling.

While we would have liked to be doing more, we feel, at least, that we are still able to offer support to some of the most vulnerable asylum seekers. Obviously, this way of operating is expensive as we are not able to utilise food contributions from parishes – so please encourage your parishioners and any other contacts to support the project financially at present.

The wisdom of afternoon tea

My wife and I were at one time missionaries with the Overseas Missionary Fellowship. We joined them in 1975 after a period of training at their headquarters in London. While we were there, we met the hostess of the Mission Home, a matronly lady who had herself served overseas. She was a formidable person, but with a soft heart, and a depth of spiritual wisdom.

I remember her offering to our group of would-be missionaries this piece of sage advice: "The missionaries who stay the longest on the field are those who have their afternoon tea." It struck me then as being very profound, and it is a life rule that I have followed ever since, with great benefits.

This practice of course is typically British, but valuable none the less. For us, a cup of tea is the answer to everything. "Let's make a cup of tea," we say in any crisis. It soothes and refreshes and helps us get things in perspective. Somehow things seem much brighter when you have had a cuppa, especially if shared with friends or colleagues.

But there is more to the custom of afternoon tea. This little ritual gives us permission to stop in the midst of a busy day and rest a while. It enables us to make contact with others, and to step back from whatever is filling our mind at the time. And over time, these little oases are the way we care for our souls as well as our bodies.

We read that Jesus, when He was tired, sat down by the well at Sychar (John 4:6). He gave Himself permission to stop and have a break. I like to think on that basis He would heartily approve of afternoon tea.

#### Leave your dandelions alone...

When mowing your lawn, avoid cutting your dandelions. That is the advice of the president of the British Ecological Society, Prof Jane Memmott. It will help to save the bees. She explains: "Dandelions are a fantastic source of pollen and nectar for the early pollinators in particular. If they were rare, people would be fighting over them, but because they're common, people pull them out and spray them with all sorts of horrible things when they should just let them flower. If you leave the lawn to three or four inches, then dandelions, clover and daisies can flower and then you end with something like a tapestry, and it's much nicer to sit there and watch the insects buzzing about." Prof Memmott encourages everyone to get a bee hotel for their garden. "There's nothing nicer than being sat in a chair with a glass of wine and watching the bees going in and out of your own personal little beehive. Even just a potted plant on a doorstep will provide lunch for a bee or a fly or a butterfly.

#### So where do we go from here?

Let's not waste this crisis. The current situation is quite dismal. Many people will die, and companies and entire industries will not survive. Even so, Covid-19 won't last forever. In six months, a year, perhaps two at the outside, life will start to look 'normal' again. That is our great danger: that Society (and the Church) will slip back into complacency and business as usual. We will congratulate ourselves that we did so well in 'our finest hour.'

That is when it will be critical that we remind our sisters and brothers that God's first command to us – to 'take care of the garden' – is still in force. Covid-19 is not the end. This is only a warning that we ignore that command at our peril. In the meantime, may I encourage you to keep on loving your community. Reach out to your neighbours. Share your hope (and supplies) selflessly and fearlessly, in the confidence that God is still on his throne. Work with your church and encourage your church leaders. This is when the church should be the church. Above all, take care of yourself. Spend time with God in creation – if you have a garden, it is probably the healthiest place you can be. Spend more time with your family – enforced isolation may turn out to be a gift.

#### Life in quarantine


Full marks to Jamie Oliver for his Channel 4 series, 'Keep Cooking and Carry On'. He showed us how to make tasty meals with basic ingredients and a minimum of fuss.

The pandemic prompted other encouraging responses. One mother in the 'at risk' category said her adult children thought she was immortal until now. Now they ring her every day to see how she's getting on. An elderly clergyman had offers to shop from two new neighbours whom he hardly knew. The whole nation stopped taking the National Health Service for granted and started showing gratitude. Telephone, television, the internet and email prevented many from going stir-crazy. Some even tried the cryptic crossword, though newcomers should be warned it takes years to learn its secrets!

The isolation was tough for many. Isolated families had to get used to each other's company and foibles for long periods, away from the park or beach. Couples were parted from each other by distance or illness. Those living alone were cut off from visitors and communal activities. Churchgoers missed Holy Communion at Easter for the first time. That should help us identify with millions of Christians across the world who have to pray in secret because their neighbours would persecute them if they did so publicly.

Alone-ness, rather than loneliness, can be productive. Albert Einstein valued time alone, when he could "go for long walks on the beach so that I can listen to what is going on inside my head." Isaac Newton's greatest discoveries began when he escaped the effects of the bubonic plague, by returning home to the family farm in Lincolnshire. He had time to observe what was going on around him and, yes, that did include watching the famous apple fall.







## Calling all those who can crochet, or those who might want to learn a new skill!

Rev Una McLean from Doxford Place Methodist Church, Cramlington, has sent out the following request: 'Would you be willing to crochet small hearts for the hospital? They may go as a 'Thank you' to staff or they may go one to a patient and one to their family.'



The pattern is not difficult if you can manage chain,

slip stitch, treble and double treble stitches. Double knit yarn or chunky wool, any colour, is perfect. A 4.5, 5 or 6mm hook will be fine.

The pattern is as follows.

Make a slip knot leaving a loose end of about 4".

Chain 4.

Slip stitch into 1st chain to make a circle.

All stitches are now worked into the centre of the circle.

Chain 3.

2 double treble (dtr) into centre of circle.

3 treble (tr) into centre of circle.

Chain 1.

1 dtr into centre of circle.

Chain 1

3 tr into centre of circle.

2 dtr into centre of circle.

Chain 3.

Slip stitch into centre of circle.

Tie off ends leaving a loose end of about 4".

Tie the two loose ends together to make a hanging loop.

At the time of going to print, no details were available about getting the hearts to Una, however don't let that stop you from starting to crochet. When you have some hearts to pass on, please call, text or email me, and hopefully, by then, I'll have information about where to send them. Many thanks.

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



#### **Church life**

Like everywhere else, the church building is closed but we appreciate very much Julian's online services and reflections (find on YouTube at Morpeth and Area URC), ably assisted by Noah and Louise and other members of St George's. #### **Broadband**

Fortunately the internet is holding up quite well most of the time, as it accommodates everyone's much greater broadband use and the huge increase in the use of Zoom and other platforms enabling people to keep in touch and work at home. This is a timely reminder that if you live in the parishes of Bavington, Kirkwhelpington, Cambo, Wallington, Corsenside, Ridsdale, East and West Woodburn, Barrasford, Birtley, Chollerton, Gunnerton or Colwell (or if you know anyone who does, please pass this information on to them), you can sign up for B4NTR's (Broadband for the North Tyne and Redesdale (and a bit beyond)) ultrafast gigabit broadband scheme (that's 1000 mbps!) which is currently in development. Having gigabit internet will be transformational for the use of the internet for work, entertainment, online banking and shopping as everything will work so much more quickly and effectively.

The plan is that Great Bavington Church will get B4NTR broadband once the scheme is implemented, so we will be able to do online research during History Night meetings, stream films and so on, which will open up all sorts of possibilities for the church.

#### **Private James Clapperton – Roll of Heroes**

To commemorate the centenary of the end of World War I, the History Night team researched the soldiers named on the Roll of Honour in the church and Ian Rawles wrote a book about them (copies still available for £5 + p&p). Since then, some more information has come to light about Private James Clapperton, thanks to Stan Owen of the Heritage Centre at Bellingham.

Private James Clapperton, Northumberland Fusiliers, died when he was in training at Hexham, six weeks after he had joined up.


Before that, he was a gamekeeper at Hesleyside near Bellingham. His death was reported in the Newcastle Journal, 27 February 1915. Stan located the death certificate which said that he died from chronic nephritis (kidney disease), rather than as a result of a training accident. Private Clapperton is buried in the cemetery at Bellingham.
