

A Message from our Minister Revd Julian Sanders

Dear Friends,

Later on this year, in July, the Commonwealth Games are taking place and many athletes looking to compete in this event will be fine tuning their training programmes to get the very most out of their bodies, and the time left available to them, so that they can be at their peak performance by the time the games begin.

Fartlek is a Swedish word which means 'fast and slow running' – and a word that came into use about the same time the Commonwealth Games was created - and used to describe a training regime for athletes that incorporated periods of fast running alternating with running at slower speeds. The word literally translates as 'speed-play'.

The word for me resonates with the inner child that is within each of us. The first four letters make the hidden 8 year old inside me snigger and giggle! But the second half of the word 'lek' also reminds me of the hidden playfulness inside us. The word remains within the Yorkshire dialect, a hangover from its Viking origins, and today 'laik' is still a word used in some areas to mean 'play'.

Fartlek encapsulates this whole idea of the intensity and drive that is required from first class athletes intent on achieving their goals, as well as the playfulness of an 8 year old who can do nothing more than amuse themselves thinking about embarrassing bodily functions. The need for a balance between fast paced intensity and slow forward movement.

This paradox almost is held within the gospel stories too. Mark's gospel is a gospel in a hurry. With the intensity and drive of an athlete, Mark races through the story of Jesus with little time to catch a breath. The Greek word *euthus* is used around 40 times in Mark's gospel, and 11 times in the first chapter. The word *euthus* means "immediately" or "straight away", and gives a sense of the urgency in which the gospel was written. Twice we read in the gospel that Jesus was so busy that he didn't even have chance to eat (3:20, 6:31)

John's gospel on the other hand is taken at a much more leisurely pace. Take, for example, the encounter with the Samaritan woman at the well. John writes:

"Now he had to go through Samaria. So he came to a town in Samaria called Sychar, near the plot of ground Jacob had given to his son Joseph. Jacob's well was there, and Jesus, tired as he was from the journey, sat down by the well. It was about noon. When a Samaritan woman came to draw water, Jesus said to her "Will you give me a drink?" His disciples had gone into town to buy food."

John 4:4-8

John then goes on for another 33 verses to make sure we get all of that conversation and the impact that that encounter had. Tony Horsfall comments on this and says "Everything that happens in this story happens because Jesus was doing nothing." And it was because Jesus was doing nothing, that he had the time to chat with this Samaritan woman, and out of that chance encounter not only is she transformed but the whole town experiences a revival.

So I might suggest that even though we may not be athletes in training, we might consider the idea of *fartlek* in our own Christian journeys. The need to balance both the speed and intensity of achieving aims and goals, with the lazy playfulness of just allowing those encounters with others and with God to develop naturally and easily – of sensing what God is doing and responding to it accordingly. There are things we need to do in order to achieve the mission that God has for us, but let us not be so focussed on this, that we miss the opportunity to stop and see what God is doing around us.

Refugees and Asylum Seekers May 2022

With refugees and asylum seekers in the news at the moment so much because of the war in Ukraine I thought it would be useful to include some facts about seeking asylum in the UK. On the WERS website there is basic information about the asylum system. We may think we know what happens but do we know it all? Can we imagine what it must feel like to be a refugee or an asylum seeker?

"Why do people seeking asylum and refugees need help when they get to the UK?

Whilst many assume that the UK is a safe and welcoming place for people seeking asylum, there are huge challenges for individuals who arrive here seeking sanctuary.

The Asylum System: The asylum system is tough. Interviews and communication with the Home Office can be incredibly stressful for individuals, many of whom have experienced trauma in their home country and on their journey here. Waiting times for asylum claims can cause anxiety and often further trauma.

Poverty: Whist government support exists (housing and weekly financial support of £39.63 a week), many then live below the poverty line, unable to buy essentials and feed their families.

Prejudice & safety: Individuals also often suffer prejudice, racism and feel unsafe in our communities.

Accessing Support: Many find it difficult to access the support they are entitled to. Language barriers are significant as well as knowledge of how our systems work in the UK. There are often issues with their accommodation, difficulties in accessing healthcare provision, education for families with children, which mean people need extra support to see their needs are met and their rights are protected.

Isolation: People seeking asylum have left their lives, their homes, friends and family members behind. Many do not know where their family are. Arriving in the UK and awaiting a decision on their asylum claim can be an incredibly lonely and isolating experience.

Positive decisions on asylum claims: The challenges do not stop if an individual is granted refugee status. People have just 28 days to find accommodation and access Universal Credit. Many can find themselves homeless at this stage. It can be a period of huge upheaval and stress for individuals who may have been waiting months and sometimes years for a decision on their asylum claim.

Negative decisions on asylum claims/ destitution: If an individual receives a negative decision on their asylum claim, their financial support stops and they are evicted from their accommodation after 21 days. They have no access to statutory support. Access to healthcare is very limited, and many who have complex health problems are issued with significant fines for treatment and care. Many people are unable to leave the UK through no fault of their own. Some are stateless and have no country to return to, some cannot obtain travel documents from their government to allow them to return, some are too sick to travel or there is no viable route home. Many asylum seekers have been destitute for many years and have strong ties in the UK with family, friends and children born here."

WERS

WERS has been publicising some of their recent activities. They have planted a native wildlife friendly beech and hawthorn hedge in their garden and had a meal of Kurdish rice and flatbreads there. They also had a Spring Fun Day at the Scotswood Garden and the families planted seeds, played in flour and crafted birds. The North East Ambulance Service put on a session on lifesaving skills for a group of Skillsmatch volunteers.

Justice and Peace

Justice and Peace reports that their services are in great demand and this is growing increasingly. In the month of March they registered 52 new clients who came from 14 different countries, with the largest numbers coming from Iraq, Syria, Eritrea, El Salvador, Sudan and Iran. In February they distributed £4300 worth of food bags and in March £5790. They also gave vouchers to the value of £1680 and £2240 in February and March respectively.

They report that they have re-started their informal English lessons. These begin with the absolute basics to help them integrate into their new communities. Many face the challenge of needing to learn complex new languages with an unfamiliar alphabet. They give an example of a volunteer searching charity shops for children's dictionaries and children's books in other languages and the joy that this has given families. They are also encouraging people to socialise and they provide games which do not rely on a common language, e.g. playing cards, dominoes, puzzles, chess, Connect four etc. Any donations of this nature would be welcomed.

Christian Aid Week is 15th - 21st May.

As with many charities Christian Aid has seen many of its fundraising activities cancelled over the past two years. However, the needs of the people they support have not gone away. I am aware of the demands on people at the moment with rising prices etc but I would ask people to consider making a donation to Christian Aid this year if at all possible. Small amounts from a lot of people add up and can make a difference.

Envelopes will be delivered to most houses within Morpeth. 'Collectors' will be responsible for delivering envelopes to set streets as usual, but the envelopes will **no**t be collected back in. Each envelope should have an address label on it providing details of where donations can be dropped off. This will be local to each house. These filled envelopes will then be counted by the church reps. Alternatively the envelopes can be posted back to Christian Aid, if simpler. I will also arrange for extra envelopes to be available in church and any filled envelopes can be put in the church collection or handed direct to me.

If you have ever been late in returning a library book, take heart: the 1704 copy of The Faith and Practice of a Church of England Man was recently handed back to Sheffield Cathedral. A handwritten inscription inside reads: "This Book belongs to ye Lending Library in Sheffield Church 1709." It left the library just over 300 years ago. Sheffield Cathedral's Reverend Canon Keith Farrow said that the family of a deceased woman who lived locally had asked in her will for it to be returned. "Now it's come back home. It's a joy to have this little jewel back in the cathedral. With overdue fines of 50p a day, librarians could have charged the family more than £54,000 for the book — which itself is worth about £300. The canon joked: "We might have got a new roof or something."

A Fond Farewell to St George's Lunchtime Concerts

It is always difficult to give people news which is perhaps not altogether unexpected but none the less upsetting. However it is with great regret that Ken and I have decided that there will be no more Lunchtime Concerts after the present series ends in May.

We have been organising these concerts for sixteen years and during that time we have seen them go from strength to strength. Originally we inherited the events from Greater Morpeth Development Trust with a regular attendance of 30 and a bank balance in the red due to the charges made by an outside organisation for overseeing them. We volunteered to run the concerts independently and free of charge. After one year we left GMDT's umbrella and we now average audiences of 120 peaking at over 180 for the very popular KEVI concerts. We have also maintained a healthy bank balance which has enabled us to invite quality musicians to perform and we have been able to keep admission charges to a minimum. Even the pandemic has not stopped our supporters rapidly returning to us and we now have 100 people coming to enjoy them. It has been a real success story and we have treasured every minute of it. We have called it 'our baby' and I can assure you that this decision has not been made lightly. These events based at St George's have been run totally independently whilst at the same time supporting both the Church and its place within the Community.

We have been able to attract musicians from the Royal Northern Sinfonia, English National Opera, Northern Opera, Sadlers Wells and also students from the Royal Academy of Music, the Royal College of Music, the Royal Northern College of Music and the Scottish Conservatoire. We have listened to amazing performances from international Jazz and Folk musicians and we have been delighted by young music makers and local school choirs. The Lunchtime Concerts have also raised funds to support the purchase of instruments by for music students and to finance their expenses whilst at Music College

This year Ken will be 90 and I will be 80 and we feel that as the organisation and provision of these events becomes more onerous we would like to 'quit whilst we are winning'. I'm sure you could consider this as being somewhat selfish but we feel that we need to reassess how we spend our time. As many of us know, with age there come certain restrictions and we have both been advised to slow down and enjoy life without taking on so many responsibilities.

We still intend where possible to organise one off evening concerts at St Georges an example of which is the forthcoming Jubilee Concert with Bradley Creswick on June 10th.

We feel we have been privileged to have had the opportunity to provide these lunchtime entertainments and to have gained so many friends through them. We couldn't have done it without Ken's pianistic skills and, as many of you have experienced, my organising 'skills' and the connections I have had with quality musicians who have loved coming and performing to such a friendly audience in a building with fantastic acoustics.

We would also like to thank everyone who has so generously supported our family charity Henry Dancer Days making it possible for us to continue the Storytelling and Pottery Projects which now take place in seven children's cancer hospitals through out Britain and to fund the grants we give to families whose children have bone cancer. We continue to work to expand into further hospitals.

Finally we must pay tribute to all those reliable helpers from St. George's who have voluntarily given their time to serve tea and coffee, organise admissions and set up the church before and tidy up after each concert. They are seldom acknowledged but we could not have done without them.

So here's to a slightly more relaxed future, but as they say, "You can't keep a good man down" as we continue with our other church commitments.





I want to share what happened this morning at our WOW service. It was around 20 to 25 past 12, just before we were due to start our service when a small family group walking into Church. This group comprised Mum, Dad and their little boy Logan.

I think he's about 4 years old. The family were just visiting Morpeth for the day, Logan saw the Church building and asked to go inside. He said he had been learning about Jesus at school. He attends St. Bede's school, Bedlington. I guess that Logan is either in Nursery or Reception class. He was interested in the sanctuary; he loved our Easter flowers, his Mum held him up so he could smell the lilies. He recognised the cross on the wall behind the pulpit as being like the one Jesus died on, we pointed out the shapes the lily arrangements were in, that they were the same shape as the cross. We also talked about the pulpit fall, he chatted about the fish, he obviously knew that there is a link with Jesus. His parents declined a cuppa; they only stayed a few minutes. Morag, fortunately, had some little chocolate Easter eggs; Logan happily accepted one of those, with parental permission of course.

This was just a lovely, short encounter with a small boy and his parents, initiated by him which we hope he will remember, Eve if just for a few days.

I just wanted to share this with everyone, it shows what can happen when we are open to the community around us.




