



### Notes by the Way October 2023 by Revd Stuart Brock

I am fascinated by DIY programmes on the TV. Perhaps this interest stems from my own lack of ability in practical matters. My capacity to drill holes in a wall to put up a shelf is minimal. I find it hard to saw wood in a straight line while nails inevitably get bent as they get hammered in. So I watch programmes that show how it ought to be done or demonstrate the confidence of those who buy properties at auction believing they can renovate even the most rundown by doing most of the hard graft themselves.

Of all these shows I think the most inspiring is DIY SOS. The presenter, Nick Knowles, leads a team of professional workers to build or repair properties where things have gone wrong. But in addition to the professional trade's people, for special major projects, he sends out the message to the community that more help is urgently needed. Recently, two of these big projects featured places and people from the northeast. One was the refurbishment of a facility used by young people in east Newcastle with complex needs. The other involved an extended family in a small Northumbrian village. Help was needed to provide extensions to the family home to make it possible for the whole family to live together in the same house. Time was limited. The word was put out for more craftspeople to volunteer. Many came and offered their services. The project was completed. But the most telling thing was the looks of amazement on the faces of the family when they saw all that had been done. It brought tears to the eyes, as did the final gathering of the family with all the workers who had contributed- not just a handful but several dozen.

Some things leapt out at me as I thought of the programme. First was the generosity of those who had freely given of their time and talents to help their previously unknown neighbours. Second was the fact that the success depended on teamwork between all those involved in the project. No easy thing when the wider group had never worked together before. The third thing was the reinforcement of a positive view of the underlying spirit of kindness and generosity of people when real needs are made clear. We see and hear on our TVs and other media so many stories of how dreadful things are in our communities. The story of people joining in to help even complete strangers gives the lie to the negativity of so much that appears on the media and makes me ask – would the society in which we live be far happier if we had more positive programmes? There is so much bad news about that it makes us think nothing good ever happens. DIY SOS says otherwise. It is good news!

### A Tribute to Chris Rowlands (1934 – 2023)

Chris was born in Manchester and when he was 5 the Second World War began, and a year later he was evacuated to Todmorden in the Pennines. He did National Service and decided to stay on serving in 1st Battalion (Queen's Company), Grenadier Guards. They say once a Grenadier, always a Grenadier, and he never lost his sense of duty, attention to detail and to correct dress, and his punctuality.

On finishing his service he moved back to Manchester. He got a job with his Uncle's construction and glazing company, went to night school to get his qualifications as a chartered surveyor, and made a successful career. He met Elizabeth whilst running a lunch errand for the company in 1961 and stopping by the bank in Oldham where she was a teller. They married & had two children, Clare and Philip. Chris faced many health problems during his forties and fifties, and Elizabeth cared for him devotedly.

Philip moved to Morpeth in 1989 & lived here for 6 years. When he went away on lengthy business trips Chris and Elizabeth used to house sit for him. They enjoyed Morpeth so much that a year after Philip left for the States they moved here, where they settled happily and made great friends in the church and the wider community. Philip settled in the States and married Joy, and they have two children Josh & Breazy. Sadly Clare died suddenly in 2009 aged only 37, leaving behind her children, Lauren and Callum, so Chris and Elizabeth spent some years travelling up and down the country helping to support them. The last three years of Elizabeth's life were definitely very difficult, but Chris was determined to care for her as long as he possibly could. Even when she was transferred to St Oswald's Chris visited daily. His sense of love and duty shone through. She died in September 2019. He never really got over losing her, but was enabled to continue living independently, as he was determined to do.

Chris' character traits highlighted above were well known to us all. He was always punctual and immaculately turned out. Serving with him as an elder I found it impossible to ever get to church before he did! We would agree a time and he would always be early, and always say "I've only just got here," but half of the jobs would have been done already. He was fastidious in undertaking his responsibilities and gave great attention to detail. Although it had been suggested to him he should ease up on his duties he was determined to keep going & adamant he would carry the heavy pulpit Bible into church.

Chris, a man who took duty & responsibility seriously; a man who committed himself wholeheartedly to his family & the life of the church.

#### **Refugees Report for October 2023**

At the moment there are very few days that go by without refugees being in the news for one reason or another. The Refugee Council asks "Can you imagine how frightening it must have felt to be one of the 39 people on board the Bibby Stockholm barge, as some of them started to fall ill?"

The Refugee Council says that "they've told us what it was like, the "shock and fear" they felt, as "news spread about the presence of an epidemic on the ship. Some of us displayed symptoms of Legionella disease, but no one responded to us.""

The Refugee Council also says "People in the asylum system are usually very traumatised already. They've lost everything – they've been forced from their homes by war or persecution, and they've often lived through violence, torture, or the death of loved ones. How we treat people seeking safety matters. Hostile policies and inhumane conditions are not the answer."

### West End Refugee Service

Wers has recently announced that it has won funding through the National Lottery Community Fund. This money will be used to boost the Activities & Connections Initiative which is intended to strengthen their community bonds. Before the summer holidays they had a session at Cramlington Learning Village where the students made welcoming messages for refugees & donated 15 bags of toiletries. There has also been gardening work on-going over the summer and in July some of them became eco explorers, going to Middleton North, where they weighed and monitored shrews, went pond dipping for damselflies & dragonflies, discovered moths & found intriguing artefacts. WERS was also supported in July by Vodafone UK who provided 300 free SIMs, packed with data and minutes, to help bridge the data divide, so that those who most need to be able to communicate are able to do so. Unfortunately WERS has not been able to restart the Drop In sessions yet, but are still aiming to do so.

Their particular needs at the moment are for baby toiletries, especially large nappies, shampoo and conditioner, shower gel, toothbrushes and deodorant. They have announced that their AGM will be on **19<sup>th</sup> October from 12 noon to 3pm** at One, Strawberry Lane, Newcastle, NE1 4BX.

### **Justice and Peace Project**

J&P have given a brief example of the difference that their service can make to refugees and asylum seekers.

" ...this month we have witnessed first-hand the difference your generosity and our volunteers make to the lives of those who encounter the project. For example, two clients who have recently arrived in Newcastle after a torturous **5-year journey** from Darfur in Sudan, were clearly moved by the welcome and respect they received – things that were apparently sadly lacking during their travels through Libya, Malta, Italy and France. As they left the centre, having been greeted in their own language and received toiletries, food, clothing and a backpack, they had experienced the essence of our project – human kindness."

They continue to see an increasing number of people using their services. Last month there were 24 new registrations, so our donations of food, toiletries and finance are very much in demand. Their particular needs at the moment are for toothbrushes, toothpaste, shower gels, deodorants, shampoo, conditioners and washing powders as well as cooking oil, coffee and rice. They also report that they have recently seen an increase in clients with babies and small children at the project and these receive a warm welcome from their volunteers. There are several activities provided for the children, such as a sand pit, soft play area and toys. They say they are also able to give out nappies and some other baby items and to provide good quality second-hand clothing donated to the SVP to help support their clients with childcare.

For anyone interested in learning more about refugees Ken Loach has directed another film, this time with Paul Laverty. It is called "The Old Oak' and follows the story and friendship of pub landlord TJ Bannatyne and Syrian refugee Yara in a small mining town in Durham. There is a trailer on the WERS website. The film can be seen at the Tyneside Cinema from 29 September to 5 October (charges apply).

### Wordsearch - St Luke

To St Luke, whose feast-day is 18<sup>th</sup> October, we owe a beautifully written gospel as well as the Book of Acts. He was a Greek physician and faithful travelling companion to St Paul. Under house arrest near the end of his life Paul noted, 'only Luke is with me'. Luke's gospel focuses on the compassion of Christ, and offers us moving parables, such as the Good Samaritan and Prodigal Son.

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
Women figure more prominently in Luke's gospel than in any other: look out for the extended story of the Virgin Birth, and stories of Mary, Elizabeth, and the woman who was a sinner. His gospel also features more poor people, more lepers, more 'sinners', who are all shown to be 'inside' the love of Christ. In Acts, Luke skilfully links sacred and profane history, as subsequent archaeology has shown. He tells of how the early Christians moved away from Jerusalem into the pagan world, and especially on to Rome.
