A Message from our Minister Revd Julian Sanders

Dear Friends,

As we approach the end of October, a quiet change is on the horizon. The days are growing shorter, the air holds a distinct chill, and soon, we'll be turning our clocks back by an hour. This shift, marking the end of British Summer Time, is a familiar rhythm of the year. For many, it's a simple adjustment—an extra hour of sleep on a Sunday morning, a slight disorientation as the light fades earlier in the evening.

But what if we looked at this annual event through a different lens? Instead of simply 'turning back the clocks,' what if we saw it as a gift? A precious, unearned hour dropped into our lives.

In our busy world, time often feels like a relentless current, pulling us along at a dizzying pace. We fill our schedules to the brim, rushing from one task to the next, often feeling like we're just trying to keep our heads above water. We yearn for more time, for a chance to pause, reflect, and simply be.

So, as you prepare to adjust your clocks, consider how you might use this special gift. Don't let it just be another hour of sleep. See it as an opportunity—a moment to be present, to connect, and to find a quiet space for your soul to catch up with your life.

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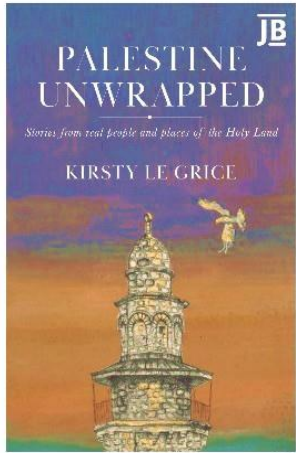
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Palestine Unwrapped

If you want to try and make sense of what's happening in Gaza just now then 'Palestine Unwrapped' by Kirsty Le Grice (the late Ted Le Grice's daughter in law) is a big help in understanding what is behind it all. Kirsty and Andrew and their two children spent three years in East Jerusalem when Andrew's work took him there in 2019 and while they were there Kirsty began a blog about their experiences which she has since turned into a book.

As well as being a different kind of tourist guide to many of the interesting places in 'The Holy Land', Kirsty tells it as it is as a resident of East Jerusalem, the Palestinian part of Jerusalem where the Foreign Embassies are based and where they lived. Unbelievably although many different nationalities attached to the Embassies lived there they witnessed Palestinian family homes down their road being bulldozed by the Israeli authorities to make room for more Israeli settlers despite the houses having been legally given to the Palestinian families who were relocated in 1948 to accommodate the new Jewish settlers in West Jerusalem.

Kirsty worked by volunteering in some Palestinian refugee camps (yes, some Palestinian families who were resettled in temporary refugee camps in 1948 are still living there) and was saddened that although she and Andrew could accept the generous hospitality of their Palestinian friends they weren't able to return the hospitality since many Palestinians were not able to get a pass from the Israeli authorities to travel to Jerusalem and weren't even allowed to go to the beach so some of the children had never seen the sea. It was even difficult sometimes for Kirsty to access some of the Jewish parts of the city despite having diplomatic plates on the car.

The book also explains a little about the historic context of the situation. Having said that it is a wonderfully uplifting book to read and Kirsty is an excellent writer. You actually feel as if you are visiting places with her - Bethlehem which is mainly inhabited by Palestine Christians, though the percentage of Christians in Israel/Palestine is very small now as many

Christians have left particularly since the Wall was erected - it can take many hours for Palestinians to get through the checkpoint to access their places of work. She also includes their amazing visit to the desert and the Dead Sea and her descriptions of the food shared generously by the locals is mouthwatering.

I fully recommend this book as not only written by 'one of our own' but also for the glimpses it gives of an interesting three years in a strange, difficult but beautiful part of the world. It is available from the publishers, Brad Guides (where you can read a fuller description of the book)

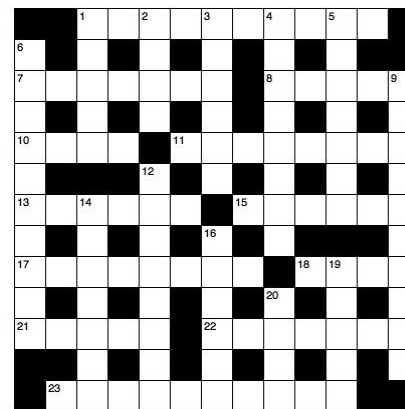

St Andrew is the patron saint of Scotland, though his only connection with the country is that some of his bones were reputedly transported in the 8th century to Fife and preserved at a church in a place now named St Andrews.

Andrew was one of the first disciples of Jesus, and the very first to bring someone else to Christ - his own brother. Like many fervent Jews at the time, Andrew and an unnamed companion had been drawn to the prophet John the Baptist. When one day John pointed Jesus out to Andrew and his friend, and described Him as the 'Lamb of God', the two young men realised that the next stage of their spiritual search was about to unfold. So, as Jesus made off, they followed Him.

When Jesus turned and asked them what they were 'seeking', all they could come up with was a lame enquiry about His current place of residence: "where are you staying"

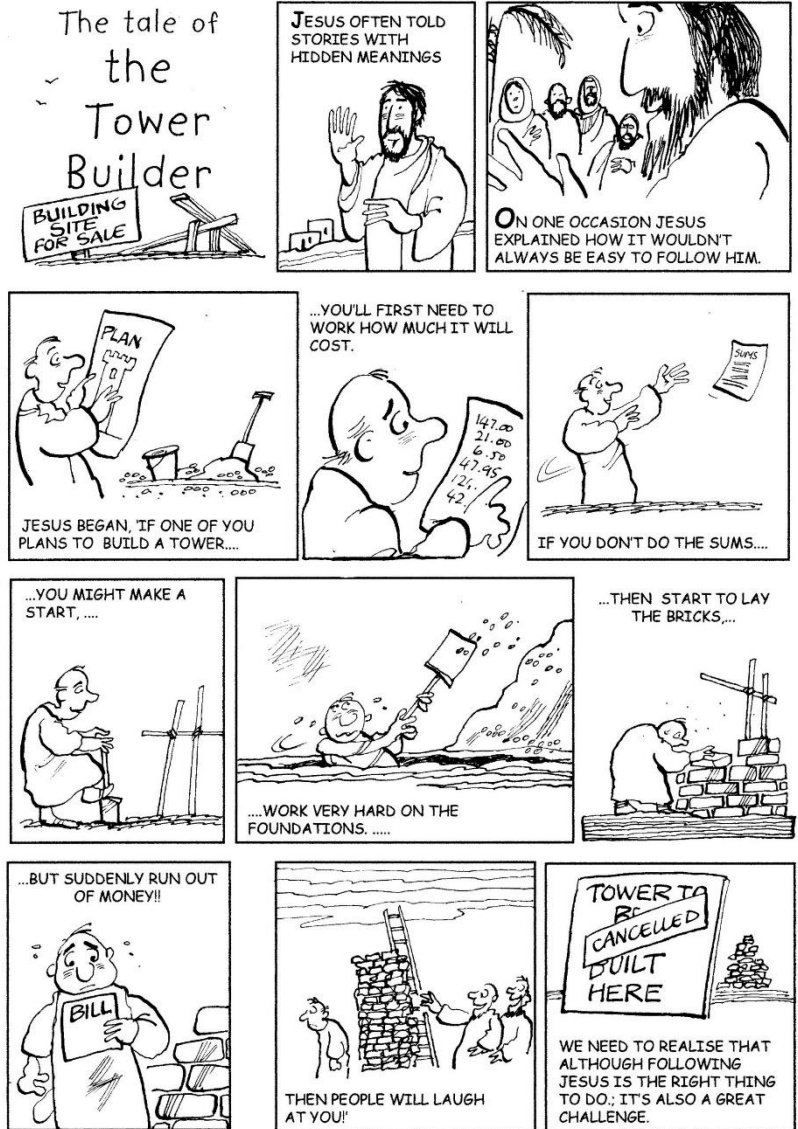
The reply of Jesus was the most straight-forward invitation anyone can receive: "Come and see". So they did, and the results of their response were life changing. For Andrew brought his brother, Peter, to Jesus, and soon the little apostolic band who would carry the message of Jesus to the whole world was formed. God said

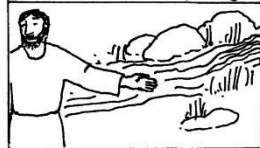
The army is too big. They will think that they beat the Midianites, not Me.
