A Message from our Minister, Revd Julian Saunders

Dear Friends,

It has been 12 months since I joined the churches here in Morpeth, Widdrington and Gt Bavington, and it has been a very different year than I was anticipating. The effects of the Coronavirus have temporarily halted a lot of the things we hoped to be doing in the church at this time, and it must be said, has interrupted the process of getting to know people properly. As the lockdown eases, it is hoped that even if 'normality' might be a long way off, things might start to happen that mean the process of getting to know people can resume.

I have been impressed with how many of you have managed to embrace the technology and have been able to get involved with some of the online things that have been happening. I hope that this will provide an opportunity to explore more diverse ways of being church in the coming year and allow even more opportunities to get to know each other.

I am also aware that for many this time of lockdown has been difficult. Some of our fellowship have sadly passed away. Others have struggled with relationships and with loneliness. With our churches open once again, I hope that they may be places where people might come and find a quiet space, a time for prayer, and a comforting shoulder to lean on (metaphorically at least!) .

This month also sees the anniversary of another important induction, that of the Rev James Anderson to Morpeth who was inducted as minister at Morpeth in 175 years ago. Known as the 'High Priest of Morpeth', the Rev Anderson from his initial induction on Sept 18th 1845 seems to have made quite an impact on the area. The Anderson Room at the church stands in memory of his lasting impact.

The "English Presbyterian Messenger" at the time reported on his induction and concluded with an editor's note that states:

"But although absent, no one then present participates more heartily in the sentiments appropriate to that joyful occasion, or more fervently prays for the blessing of Almighty God on the union then formed, or more confidently anticipates the happiest results not only to our own branch of the Church but to the whole household of faith in that quarter, from the zeal, judgement, energy and devotedness by which Mr Anderson is so eminently characterized. Let the people of Morpeth but second their minister, and our hopes will be more than realized."

Rev Anderson embarked on growing the congregation, overseeing the building of the current church building, and continued to minister in Morpeth for 37 years until he died in 1882. His successor Dr Drysdale said of him that he had "a position of unique and commanding influence, not only in raising this congregation to a state of prosperity it had never previously known, but in reviving the whole Presbyterian interest throughout the country, to which he was a tower of strength by the weight of his character and counsels."

It's a legacy that is difficult to live up to, but in the coming months I hope we will find opportunities to build upon the strong foundations already laid, and continue to grow deeper in faith and closer in our fellowship together, With every blessing,

"As we return to worshipping together in our church buildings some important regulations need to be followed in order to make this as safe as possible for everybody. When you come into the church building please remember:

Please only return to church if you feel it is safe for you to do so. Social distancing will be in place and we will be requiring people to maintain a 2m distance

You will need to wear a mask, so please bring your own if you have one.

You will need to sanitize your hands on entering the building and on leaving.

You will be asked to leave your name and contact details for Track and Trace purposes.

Those within the same household bubble will be able to sit together, but otherwise you will need to sit in designated seats to ensure spacing.

There will be no singing during worship.

We aim to do everything we can to make our church buildings as safe as possible and look forward to welcoming you back to worshipping with us."

West End Refugee Service

September 2020

WERS has expressed appreciation of the financial donations they have been receiving. These have enabled them to secure and enhance their support of destitute clients. They have also been able to introduced prepayment cards for hardship clients giving them a chance to budget for themselves. WERS has also been providing toiletries and cleaning products as well as regular food parcels.

They explain that their clients have "experienced many of the hardships that were already sadly a reality to them, in ever more intense ways. Social isolation, anxiety about the future and their case, inability to work or pursue their studies, financial hardship, food poverty, and a sense of their lives being on hold – all being increasingly present in their lives."

They have continued to provide support and food parcels and have also produced activity packs for families with children. The clothing store is still closed, but they can meet need from the stocks in their garage. They are asking for donations of cleaning products, hand sanitisers and elastic for face masks.

Now that lockdown requirements have eased some home visits have been taking place again, safely outside in gardens wherever possible and they have also just restarted some drop in sessions.

Whilst this has been happening, Sean Gladwin, WERS Director since April 2019 left his role in June. He paid tribute to the "amazing work with an incredibly dedicated small team, who work every day to make a difference to the lives of asylum seekers and refugees." Hannah Barnes, an existing member of staff has taken on the role of Acting Director.

Justice and Peace Project

The J&P Project have reported some excellent news that due to a generous grant from the Albert Gubay Foundation they have been able to extend the successful supermarket voucher scheme. Until recently they were able to send digital vouchers to the mobile phones of destitute clients so they could purchase goods to the value of £30 in the relevant supermarket. The recent grant has meant that this has been increased to £35 per month for destitute clients. In addition they can now offer their other clients a £20 voucher each month.

They have also been able to secure the temporary services of an additional project worker to assist their work.

At the time of writing this report there are no definite plans yet for the reopening of their premises.

Please remember that both of these organisations still need our support at a time when we are unable to send clothing and food donations. Please remember them and support them as you are able.



Method:


- 1 Download and print off appropriate music part
