

# Notes by the Way for September, by Revd Stuart Brock

On my desk is a drink coaster with a Latin tag on it. It is a constant reminder to me of one of my many failings. I thought this phrase was usually attributed to Julius Caesar, but according to the coaster it is, allegedly, the wisdom of one Quintus Horaitus Flaccus. No, I had no idea who he was either! That is, until I Googled him. He appears to be otherwise known as the poet Horace. His dictum was "Carpe Diem" – Seize the Day. It is an encouragement not to waste time, dilly dally or procrastinate when important decisions are being made.

It isn't just the ancient philosophers and academics who saw the need to seize the moment. It is said that Winston Churchill had a tray on his desk of war time papers on which was written "for action this day" – an instant reminder that there was no time to waste in pursuing victory in the war.

I must admit that I am very bad at accepting this dictum for myself. Presented with a conundrum, I often take way too long to make up my mind how and whether I am going to tackle it.

Procrastination is my middle name. I will examine the issue to its ninth degree and put off making a decision as long as possible in case there is any fresh information which may alter my response.

Delaying decisions can be useful. Too many decisions in public life are made on the hoof without seeing the possible consequences just because people want to show they have done something. But sometimes, not making a decision is actually making a decision not to act! In my own defence I have to say that normally once I have made a decision I become doggedly determined to run with it.

We all have significant decisions to make in life from choices of school for our kids, college for our teenagers, who becomes our husband/wife/partner, whether to change jobs, to whether to stay with the church even though our faith is sometimes shaken by events.

The most critical decision that we can make is whether to engage in a personal relationship with God who sends the Spirit to guide us in every aspect of our living. The decision to welcome the Spirit into our lives is one which will change them permanently. It is not a decision to be made lightly but it should be a fulfilling and joyful one. So maybe now is the time to Carpe Diem: seize the moment.

# **Refugees September 2023**

### **WERS**

"How did people feel during the pandemic? Not doing anything, not meeting anyone, not seeing your loved ones. For us, every day is like a day in lockdown. We are stuck."

These are the words of Sadia, one of the refugees who is part of WERS. They are very poignant words. We may think of refugees having endured traumatic journeys to get to Britain. We may think about the difficulties they have in a strange country with different languages, different customs and foods. We may think of their anxieties about their future. But, these words from Sadia bring home just a fraction of what it must feel like to be in limbo in a foreign land – waiting and waiting and not knowing, not being able to plan. We can all recall how we felt during lockdown. Most of us struggled with the restrictions imposed. Perhaps remembering this is a way for us to imagine in a small way what it is like to be a refugee, cut off from our home, isolated, frightened and then rejected.

### **Justice and Peace project**

The J&P Project regularly provides details of the practical support it provides. Total Number of current clients: (The number of clients who have received our support once or multiple times in the last 3 months) 535. This is 480 Green Register Clients (those with some government support while claiming asylum): 55 White Register Clients (destitute clients whose claim was refused and government support withdrawn):

Vouchers given to 46 clients (at £40 each) £ 1840 Gift Card Given for refugee week to 26 clients (at £5 each) £130 Client footfall to the centre in July: 325, which comprised 292 green card & 33 white card.

Food bag beneficiaries in July: 558, 37 of whom were white card New clients registered in July: 33 Green card Clients & children supported by the clothing bank: Estimated at 85 1302 Food bags at £7 a bag with a value of £ 9,114.

J&P "With inflation figures continuing to be high and food inflation on items like bread, cereal and chocolate reported at 18.3% in July, everyone is feeling the pinch and we are aware that contributions to the Justice and Peace Project are under pressure too. However, we are keen to ensure those who are worst off in our community are not forgotten at this challenging time.

We continue to rely heavily on your generosity both for donations of food and toiletries and for financial donations, which allow us to purchase items that we need for our clients."

Your prayers for the work of these two organisations are as ever appreciated and any contributions, (financial, food, goods) are always welcomed by them.

# A Message from Revd Louise Sanders

I would like to thank all those who travelled to St Andrews's, Monkseaton to help me celebrate my Ordination and Induction. It was such a special occasion and it was wonderful to be able to share with so many friends from St. George's. Throughout my four years of training I have felt the love and prayers of the church, not only for myself but for the whole family.

Thank you to each and every one of you, and also for the many cards and gifts I received, not only for my Ordination but also for my Birthday – I have felt truly blessed.

# **Update on the Beehouse**

You may have heard people speak about the "Beehouse" as this is a project we have been supporting since the beginning of the summer. It is actually the "Beehouse Love Orphanage" which is in Rivne, Ukraine. The orphanage was founded 25 years ago and has around 25 teenagers in their care. They contacted us through the work being



done with the Ukrainian Coffee Mornings, because they were facing the ongoing crisis in Ukraine where it is becoming increasingly difficult to cover the running costs of food and energy for the home.

We agreed that we would try to find a number of people who would be willing to sponsor this project so that regular monthly payments could be made to help cover the costs. So far we have 14 people who have agreed to be sponsors and we are able to send monthly payments of around £165 to the orphanage. The response has been better than I could have imagined, and the generosity of people has been a fantastic witness to the love of Christ among us.

Alongside this a special Coffee Morning was held on the 5<sup>th</sup> August where an additional £900 was raised which has been sent across to the Beehouse. We have received a few videos from the orphanage which we have now shared during some of our services, and are in communication with the orphanage through our link person Tatiana Arendarchuk. She messaged to say: "The Bee House got the money from you and they are very happy and say a big thank you to all those kind people who support them. And a huge thank you from me personally to you for being so kind and supportive."

Thank you from me to everyone who have been so generous in supporting them at this time.

# Our coffee morning in aid of the Beehouse Orphanage

On Saturday the 5th August we held our coffee morning in aid of the Beehouse Orphanage in Rivne, Ukraine. We had a raffle with fifteen bee related prizes. It's amazing how many bee-related items there are in the shops! We also raffled a beautiful basket of flowers - with a bee on the basket of course! Many of our ladies had been knitting and crocheting small and large bees which were used

to decorate the church and were then sold to add to our grand total. Our Ukrainian friends love baking and produced their famous honey cake, apple cake and cheesecake which quickly sold alongside all the baked goodies supplied by our members. Tea, coffee and scones went down well on this rather wet and windy morning and everyone enjoyed meeting up with friends for a chat.

The total raised was approximately £900 and we thank you all for your generous donations. We have already had messages of thanks from the young people in the orphanage and from Tatiana Arendarchuk, our contact in Rivne.

He's a bit scatty nowadays, but I know he misses Morpeth and when he loses track of everything that has happened he still asks when he'll get back there.

I'm starting to wonder the same thing. 


